

FLEEING FEDERALS IN BATTLE WITH PURSUING REBELS

EL PASO, Texas, April 3.—Fighting between General Rosatto Hernandez' rebel force and the vanguard of General Velasco's fleeing federalists from Torreon was reported today by General Villa to General Carranza at Juarez.

The skirmish, Villa stated, occurred southeast of Canon el Guarache and several federalists were killed and many wounded. Hernandez was trying, according to the message to engage the main column and drive it back upon Torreon.

How many men Velasco had with him was not known but it was believed from Hernandez' reports to be much larger than was at first supposed.

It was considered evident that the federalists were trying to get to Sactilla. Hernandez' men, however, barred the way, and with General Contrera's division coming up behind, Velasco seemed certain to be caught between two fires.

BULL MOOSE ORATORS SPEAK AT WENATCHEE

WENATCHEE, Wash., April 3.—Medill McCormick of Chicago, one of the leading progressives in the country, and Ole Hanson, candidate for the United States senate, will be the principal speakers here at a bull moose mass meeting Monday night.

Ole Hanson, speaking at Coulee, Wash., last night drew the largest audience ever assembled in Grant county, and predicts a sweeping bull moose victory in this state this fall.

CHARTER DRAFTERS STUDY OTHER CITIES

The drafting committee of the charter commission held another meeting last night, given over largely to a discussion of the organization and powers of the city's legislative body. A careful study of the determination of other cities, notably Berkeley, Colorado Springs, Tacoma and Dayton, on these points, is being made. Meetings are held weekly and will be more frequent as the work progresses.

Mr. Dow is truly called the father of prohibition, as he was the first to begin a systematic and persistent warfare in Maine against the evils of intemperance.

John B. Gough did him the honor to say of him, "that he was a head and shoulders above all statesmen and speakers." Horace Greely said "that he was a prophet and a statesman of statesmen."

It was in the year 1892 that the women of the W. C. T. U. conceived the idea of honoring him by holding "Neal Dow" meetings, which custom has been adhered to ever since. He died in 1897, full of years and mourned by all who had ever come in contact with him.

A paper was read by Mrs. Leonard, in-re our late beloved president, Mrs. Edith Hill Booker, who has gone to her reward.

Mrs. Manning gave a most entertaining and amusing reading, entitled, "Not Dead, Nor Dreaming"; also one on the subject of "Does Prohibition Prohibit?" which certainly proved to her hearers that it does.

Mrs. Fleming read a paper which her mother, Mrs. Gilkey, a strenuous worker in the cause, wrote on Neal Dow.

Mrs. McCullough rendered some interesting excerpts on the life of Neal Dow and strongly endorsed the statement of Horace Greely.

CITY OWNED TROLLEY BREAKS ALL RECORDS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 3.—The Geary street municipal street railway broke all previous records in March when a total of \$58,969.50 was recorded as earnings, according to figures given out here today. This exceeds by \$300 any previous month, the next biggest being \$58,663.50 for last October.

The Union street line, included in the municipal system, also held up its end with a total of \$29,710.10, which is more than half the amount earned by the Geary street line, while it is not half the length of that road, and did not cost one-sixth as much as the Geary street line. The two roads earned \$88,684.60 during March. The daily average earnings of the Geary street line were \$1,902.24, and those of the Union street line \$958.55.
