"I do not think anything more could have been done."

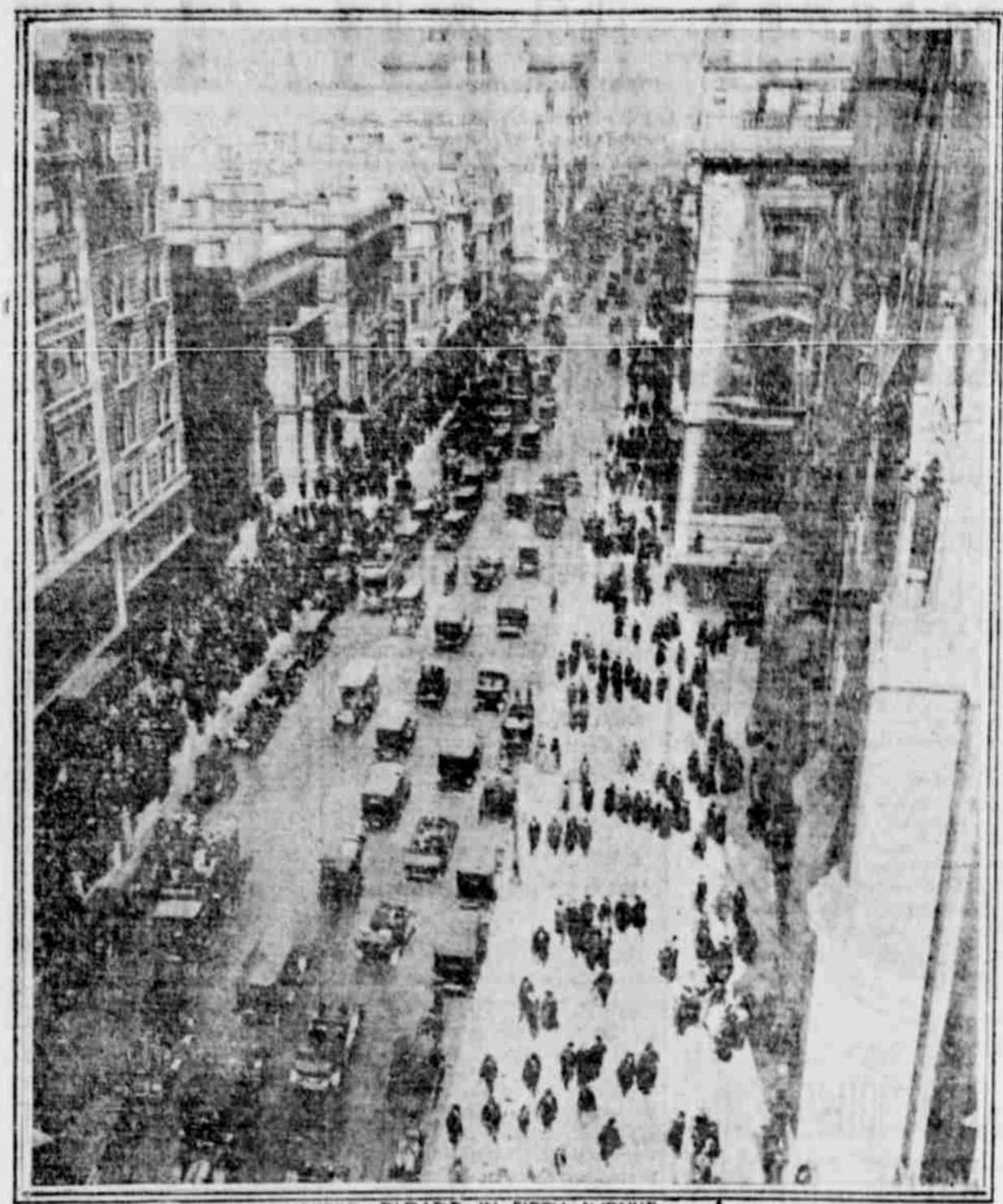
"Do you know the rent the miners pay or that the Colorado Fuel Iron company owns the houses they live in, and three hundred thousand acres of land?"

DENY HABEAS CORPUS TO MEXICAN REFUGEES

FT. WORTH, Tex., April 6.—Federal Judge Mack today refused to grant a habeas corpus writ for the 5000 Mexican federalists held prisoners at Fort Bliss. They were soldiers who fled into the United States after defeat by the rebels and were detained by the military authorities.

WEYERHAUSER TO ESCAPE INHERITANCE TAX IN OREGON

SALEM, Or., April 6.—The estate of Frederick Weyerhaeuser in this state will avoid paying an inheritance tax here because the vast timber holdings are held by a corporation instead of being the personal property of Weyerhaeuser, who died at Pasadena Saturday. State Forester F. A. Elliott estimated today that the Weyerhaeuser timber holdings in Oregon, approximating 450,000 acres, are easily worth \$18,000,000. Inheritance tax on this valuation would amount to not less than \$180,000.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., April 6.—James Henderson, 35 years old, is dead here today and several others are injured as the result of an automobile accident on Emis creek bridge, near here, Sunday.

PARADENA, Cal., April 6.—If Frederick W. Weyerhaeuser left a will disposing of his vast wealth, he guarded successfully not only the contents of the document, but the knowledge of its existence. Relatives who left here yesterday with the timber king's body professed to know nothing of a will, although their knowledge of his systematic methods leads them to believe such an instrument exists and is in the hands of his St. Paul attorneys.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—President Perkins of the National drainage commission was authority for the statement today that President Wilson, Speaker Clark and other democratic leaders had agreed to postpone legislation for flood prevention, drainage and waterpower until next session of congress.

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SAFETY AT SEA FINDINGS BEFORE SENATE FOR ACTION

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The findings of the London safety-at-sea conference were slated to come before the senate foreign relations committee this afternoon for ratification or rejection.

The committee was split. Some members believed President Andrew Furber of the International Seamen's Union was right in opposing the conference's report, on the ground that the proposed treaty would prevent the United States from accomplishing reforms applying to foreign vessels visiting American ports.

On the other hand, Chairman Alexander of the American delegation which attended the conference told the committee that American inspectors would have the right to go behind certificates and see if ships were actually in the condition certified to.

One of the most important objections raised to the treaty was that it would render it impossible to carry out the reforms provided for by the La Follette seamen's bill and La Follette himself was expected to lead the fight against its ratification.

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PAVING CREWS REINFORCE CONCRETE AT HOPKINS CURVE

State Highway Engineer H. L. Bowlby arrived in Medford Monday to spend several days on the Pacific highway work. He finds 100 men at work on the Hopkins grade and 50 men on the Central Point section. More men are wanted on both. The county pays a minimum of \$2.25 for an eight hour day on the Central Point paving work.

The paving gang are now at work on the curve this side of Central Point. This curve is being paved six inches in thickness and is reinforced with steel rods. This is because the fill is recent and has not had time to settle.

From the curve south the work is expected to go much faster.
