MAY GRANT RESPITE TO GUNMEN WAITING DEATH ALBANY, N. Y., April 10.—Eleven words written on a slip of white paper found today in a bundle of correspondence by L. B. M. Brown, of New York may prove the means of obtaining a stay of execution for the four gunmen convicted of murdering Herman Rosenthal.

According to Brown, the note which contains a warning against giving credence to the statements of Morris Luban and Max Margolis who were witnesses against the gunmen, was written by a former assistant to District Attorney Whitman, intended for the guidance of former Governor Sulzer. The note bears no date nor signature.

Brown said it was written early last fall. The note says "Be very careful as to anything given by Luban or Margolis."

RESERVE CLAUSE VOID (Continued from page 1.) added Judge Sessions, "In this litigation are the provisions in the 1913 contract between the defendants and the relative reservation of a player for the succeeding season, valid and enforceable; second, are the plaintiffs by their own conduct barred from seeking relief in a court of equity."

Court Gives Reasons "Leading authorities are agreed that executory contracts of this nature can neither be enforced in equity nor form the basis of an action at law to recover damages for their breach. The reasons for the decisions are that such contracts are lacking in necessary qualities of definiteness, certainty and mutuality. The 1913 contracts between the defendant Kliffier relative to the reservation of the defendant for 1914 are lacking in these essential elements. It is wholly uncertain and indefinite in respect to salary and in respect to the terms and conditions of proposed employment. Although founded upon sufficient consideration, it lacks mutuality because the Philadelphia club may terminate the contract at any time upon ten days' notice, while the other party has not such option and is bound during the entire contract period. The contract exists, but if broken by either party the other is without remedy, because the courts are helpless either to enforce performance or award damages for any breach."

PHILADELPHIA TAILORS WIN STRIKE DEMANDS

The employers virtually agreed to a ten per cent increase in pay and a 9 hour work week day demanded by the tailors.
