

DOROTHY ARNOLD'S FATHER DISBELIEVES STORY OF DAUGHTER

NEW YORK, April 10.—Francis Arnold, Dorothy Arnold's father, expressed entire disbelief here today in the story that his daughter died in Dr. C. C. Meredith's maternity hospital in a Pittsburg suburb.

"I believe my daughter is dead," he said, "but I am convinced she died the day she disappeared or immediately afterwards. The theory I have always inclined to was that she was kidnapped and made away with in a very short time. We never found a clew leading to Pittsburg and I do not believe a word of the story."

Arnold's attorney, John Keith, however, said that he heard the girl was in Pittsburg and investigated there but without result. He expressed himself as positive she was not at the Meredith hospital at that time as that was one of the places he watched, posted two detectives on guard over it before he made his own presence known, and he was convinced she could not have been spirited away without his knowledge.

AID FOR RECLAMATION ADVOCATED BY WEST

DENVER, Colo., April 10.—Creation of state and national funds for reclamation purposes was urged by Governor West of Oregon at last night's session of the irrigation conference here. The money would be paid eventually by settlers, according to West's plan.

Every western delegate to the conference agreed today that a longer time for payment should be allowed settlers under the Carey act and reclamation projects.

YOUTH KILLED BEATING WAY NEAR COLESTIN

Milton M. Austin was instantly killed and badly mangled on the Southern Pacific at White Point, this side of Colestin, last Friday evening—presumably by a northbound passenger train on which it is supposed he was riding the brake beam. His right leg was completely severed, his right arm fractured, his jaw broken and his face and scalp badly gashed.

The deceased was born at Staplehurst, about twenty-eight years ago, and was apparently not a regular hobo, but merely beating his way over the railroad. He had but recently been discharged from the United States navy.—Ashland Tidings.

WEED LUMBER COMPANY ACQUITTED BY JURY

YREKA, April 10.—The trial of the Weed Lumber company on the charge of issuing coupon books to their employees, contrary to law, occupied a week, having commenced in Justice Johnson's court in Yreka on April 2. A large number of witnesses were examined and the testimony was completed Tuesday. Wednesday the arguments were made and the case given to the jury Wednesday evening. The jury rendered a verdict of acquittal.

CONVICTED OF MURDER COMMITTED OVER DOG

REDDING, Cal., April 10.—Paul Schmidt stands convicted here today of second degree murder for killing Matthew Trask. The shooting occurred when Trask saw his dog lying dead at Schmidt's gate. The jury deliberated eight hours and voted for conviction on the fifteenth ballot.

LANDSCAPE ENGINEER FOR YOSEMITE PARK

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10.—Mark Daniels of San Francisco was appointed yesterday by Secretary of the Interior Franklin K. Lane to be landscape engineer for the Yosemite valley. His duties will be to remove such objectionable features as exist and to preserve the features that have made the valley famous.

Daniels is an additional officer in the management of the valley, and while he will be responsible for the beauty of the reservation, there is no intention of substituting a new plan of control that would affect the present superintendent and the army patrol.

The new post was created by the national civil service commission and Daniels was selected from a long list of applicants, including many well-known eastern landscape engineers.

In discussing the policy to be pursued in the valley, Daniels said yesterday:

"The problems in the Yosemite valley comprise sanitation, water supply, lighting, patrol, fire protection, insect control, control of congestions and many other things. The number of people visiting the valley has increased annually, the total last year being 13,735. The problem of laying out a village for the accommodation of these people is urgent and the need of action is serious.

"The architecture of the buildings in the valley at the present time is of a nondescript character and it is the desire of Secretary Lane that any plans submitted shall comprehend the adoption of a standard of architecture in harmony with the wonderful region.

"The plans I am now preparing will include designing of bridges, the selection of types of architecture for government buildings, the location of scenic roads, the thinning of vistas in the valley and the planning of others."

PLAN PROSECUTION OF NEWSPAPERS IN PAY OF MONOPOLY

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Reiterating the belief that Postmaster General Burleson has information that certain newspapers are violating the general publicity law, Representative Barnhart stated this afternoon that he did not wish, however, to appear as the instigator of charges against the newspapers.

"The postmaster brought the matter to my attention, asking if I thought the newspapers might be prosecuted for receiving pay and printing all or part of articles opposing the canal tolls repeal on their editorial and news pages," Barnhart said. "I told him I was not a lawyer, but that I believe the law meant what it said, and that such acts were violations, even if the editorial matter was paid for without being designated 'advertising.'"
