

WEATHER BUREAU WILLING TO NAME PATHOLOGIST AGENT

The Commercial club has received the following telegram from Senator Chamberlain:

Washington, D. C., April 16, Commercial Club, Medford, Oregon.

Had further conference with agricultural department officials. Government weather bureau has no power to provide pathologist in place of Professor O'Gara but will continue weather station service under one of their agents. If local authorities employ a pathologist as heretofore, we can probably secure his appointment as weather bureau agent, just as O'Gara served in both capacities.

Dear Mr. O'Gara:

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 22, 1914, in reference to the supposed dismantling of the weather bureau station at Medford, Oregon.

In reply, I beg to advise you that, while action has been taken to change the instrumental equipment of this station, the value of the service rendered to Medford and vicinity will in no way be detrimentally affected. Every effort is being made by the weather bureau to maintain the valuable frost warning service in this section without interruption and, pending the selection of some perfectly competent local representative of the bureau, one of its trained officials will manage the station until the frost season is passed. Our experience indicates that the equipment as changed is adequate to enable us to render sufficient frost warning service and we feel that the local interests will in no way suffer as a result of the changes made.

MOTION PICTURE ACTOR LACERATED BY LION

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 17.—Suffering from severe lacerations of the shoulder and side and threatened with blood poisoning as the result of an attack by a lion during a performance before a camera, Warner Kirby, a motion picture actor, is in a serious condition today.

The lion attacked Kirby without warning while half a hundred "movie" people were going through the scene. Attendants armed with iron pipes drove the beast away from his victim.

CHOATE, TAFT FAVOR CANAL TOLLS REPEAL

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Joseph H. Choate, American ambassador to Great Britain during the negotiation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty believes the correspondence with the British government at the time precludes the idea that the American coastwise shipping can be exempted from the Panama canal tolls.

Former President Taft, who signed the Panama canal act containing the exemption clause thought that in doing so he was granting a subsidy to American coastwise shipping and believes that unless congress reverses itself the United States must submit the question to arbitration.

These points were brought out today at the senate canal committee hearing.

Senator Simmons introduced a transcript of the address delivered by Taft before the Canadian club at Ottawa last January. Choate's views were submitted in a letter to Henry White, secretary of the American embassy at London while Choate was ambassador.

Mr. Eugen Boross, banker and art collector, whose home is in Larchmont, N. Y., is rejoicing in the possession of a "Holy Family," by Murillo, which he did not know he owned until after Dr. August L. Mayer, an authority on Spanish art, came to New York recently. Mr. Boross acquired the painting a year ago, in Vienna, as a work of an unidentified artist of the Spanish school, paying for it a price that is only a small fraction of its value as an authenticated work by the great Spanish master.

Dr. Mayer, who came to America especially to see the paintings by Spanish artists in American collections, saw Mr. Boross' picture and unhesitatingly pronounced it a Murillo.

The painting is six feet and one inch high and five feet and one inch wide. It shows Joseph holding the Child toward Mary. The coloring is most beautiful.

REPEAL OF CANAL TOLLS CHAMPIONED BY R. A. BALLINGER

SEATTLE, Wash., April 17.—Judge Richard A. Ballinger, former secretary of the interior in President Taft's cabinet will support President Wilson's contention for the repeal of free canal tolls in a debate with W. T. Doyell before the Men's club of the Plymouth Congregational church here next Tuesday night. Judge Ballinger at a recent Alaska celebration made first announcement that he supported President Wilson's canal tolls policy. Added interest to the debate is given because of the fact that Doyell is one of the most prominent "old line" republicans of the state. He conducted the case of the so-called "regular republicans" in the contest with the progressives before the national republican committee at Chicago just prior to the Chicago convention.

GOETHALS TO TESTIFY ON TOLLS REPEAL

WASHINGTON, April 17.—A request to testify before the senate canal tolls committee was sent today to Colonel George W. Goethals, governor of the Panama canal zone, by Senator Simmons of North Carolina. It was not believed Colonel Goethals could reach Washington before April 24, the date set for the closing of the hearings. He is expected to favor the repeal of the exemption clause of the canal tolls act. If Goethals reaches here too late to testify at the hearings, his testimony probably will be given from the floor of the senate.

HEAD DEFUNCT BANK DIES MENTAL WRECK

CHICAGO, April 17.—Dr. William T. Kirby, head of the defunct Kirby Savings bank, died at a hospital today a mental wreck. When the bank closed November 2, 1912, Kirby could not be found by his depositors. It was declared there were \$20,000 in deposits but none of the money could be found. Attorneys for Kirby and receiver finished their arguments before Federal Judge Landis only a few weeks ago, the court taking the case under advisement. If he ruled against Kirby and his wife, he intimated they would either go to jail or produce the \$20,000.
