

### JUDGE BENNETT, CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR, HERE

Judge A. S. Bennett of The Dalles, a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor, spent Thursday evening and Friday in Medford, shaking hands and getting acquainted. Mr. Bennett has the same platform that all candidates of every party have, lower taxes and fewer commissions, and law enforcement, but not of the Governor West kind. He was taken around by Porter J. Neff and Judge Parlin and created a favorable impression.

Mr. Bennett thinks the race between himself and Dr. Smith for the nomination, with Manning third. He is a pioneer of Oregon and practiced law for many years. He was a receiver for the O. R. & N. when it was in the federal court and his last public appearance was as attorney for the late Senator John H. Mitchell, whom he vigorously defended against the land fraud charges prosecuted by F. J. Heney.

### MAYO'S DEMAND OF MEXICO ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The state department made public this afternoon the terms of Admiral Mayo's demand for a salute of the American flag by the federal military authorities at Tampico. It referred to the arrest of American Assistant Paymaster Kopp and the bludgeoning who accompanied him as a hostile act not to be excused, and added that "responsibility for hostile acts cannot be avoided by pleas of ignorance."

and collected and insisted that he was not hurt.

Mayor Mitchell took entire personal charge of the situation. He directed the desk sergeants and told them what hospital ambulance to call. Police lines were thrown about the station, but the police experienced much difficulty in handling the crowds.

The old man refused at first to divulge his name. His clothes were tattered and torn, and he wore a celluloid collar. The name "David Rose" was printed on his underclothing.

It seemed probable that the assailant was a victim of hallucinations. He was weak and emaciated and looked to be about 50 years of age.

"Everything is all right," was all the police could get him to say.

A letter addressed to Mayor Armstrong of Pittsburg was found in the prisoner's pocket. It read:

"Armstrong; You have done your part and you ———, we will do our part soon, and you will see what part it will be."

### HUERTA EVASIVE, WILSON ISSUES FINAL WARNING

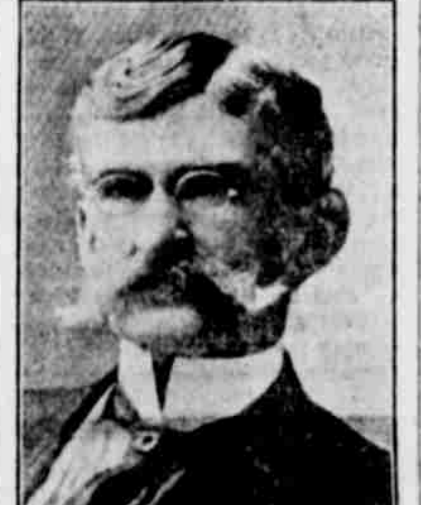
WASHINGTON, April 17.—The administration sent its ultimatum to Mexico City this afternoon.
