

PEG 'O MY HEART  
CHARMING COMEDY

Two of the most prominent characters in Oliver Morosco's production of J. Hartley Mankers' charming comedy of joyous youth, "Peg O' My Heart," are voiceless, one never appears but is continually quoted to the great enjoyment of the audience, who laugh at his wit, feel the subtlety of his philosophy and the stinging satire of his epigrams.

The other character is Michael, who is much in evidence, unconsciously poses as the means of invidious comparison, and who utters no sound, and yet occupies the unique position of being one of the greatest matinee idols the American stage has known in ten years.

The first is Peg's father, a new do well young Irishman, who has eloped with the daughter of an aristocratic English family, and come to America, where Margaret, his daughter, or as he always spoke of her, Peg O' My Heart, was born.

Michael is a nondescript, mongrel cur, with just enough Irish terrier in his make-up to be full of fight and affection.

It is largely around the sayings of her father and the comparisons made in Michael's favor that Peg is enabled to ultimately worst the snobbish, cold-blooded, selfish aunt, and cousins of hers, in whose English home she has been thrust against her inclination and will.

There is a very pretty love story running through the comedy, which sparkles with apt epigram, brilliant wit, cutting irony, biting invective and tears and laughter.

Mr. Oliver Morosco, who gave "Peg O' My Heart" to the world, is sending charming Peggy O'Neil here, supported by an excellent company to present the most talked of comedy the American stage has known in the past decade. In the cast are Martin Sabine, Roland Hogue, Jane Meredith, Joseph Yanner, Frazier Coulter, Olin Field and A. T. Hendon. The production is an exact copy of that used in the Cort Theater New York.

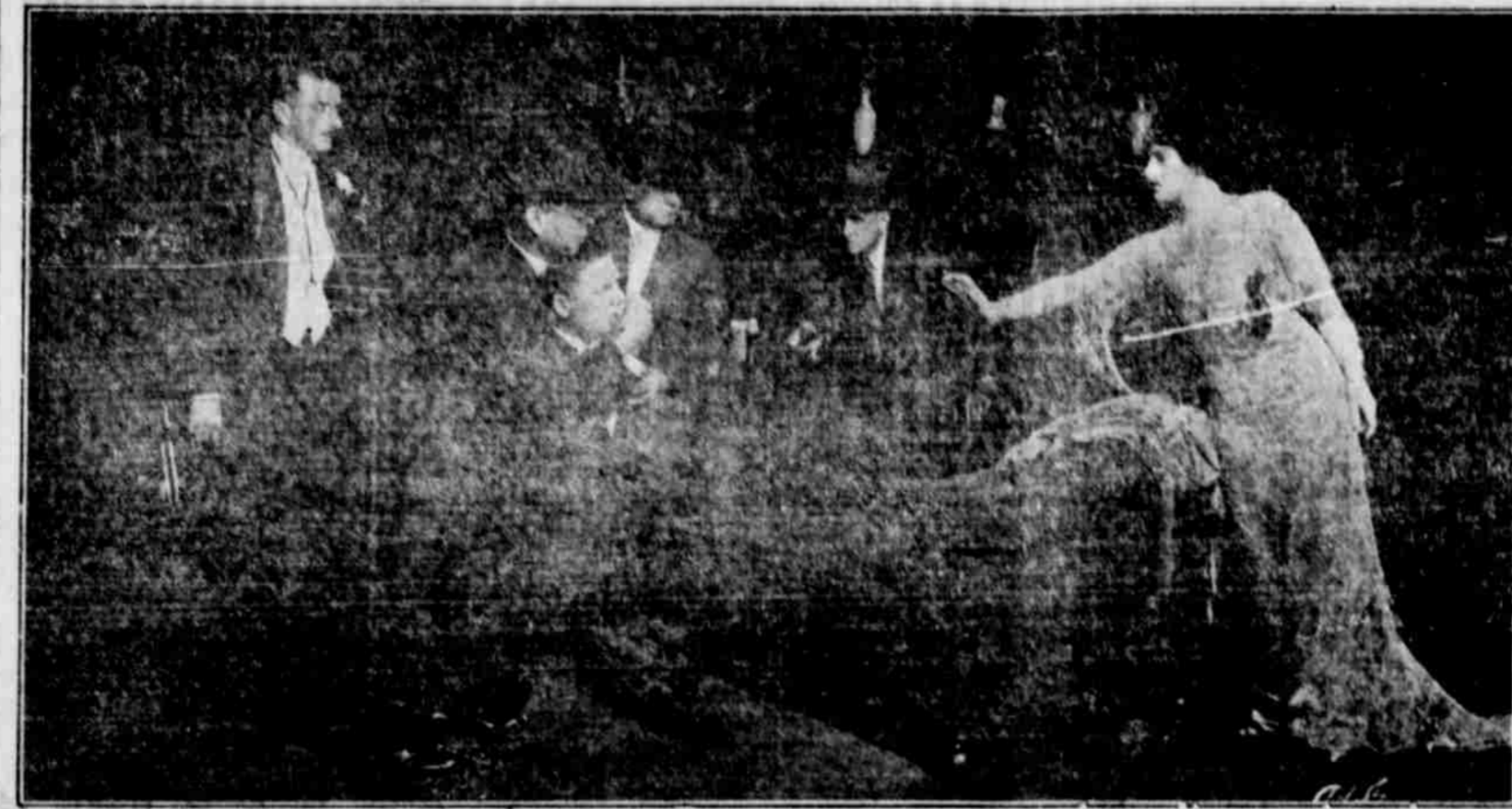

CHINESE EXPIATES CRIME ON SCAFFOLD

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., April 17.—Lee Nam Chin, a Korean, went to his death on the scaffold at the state penitentiary here at 10 o'clock today. He murdered a Chinese fellow inmate man after a dispute over a bunk house bed.

STOCKTON, April 17.—Lee Nam Chin, executed today at San Quentin, murdered Kim Yuen on Staten Island, near here, in September, 1912. Chin lay in wait for his victim, following a quarrel, and shot him as he was passing along a road in a wagon. Eight of the jurors who convicted Chin signed a petition to Governor Johnson asking that the man's life be spared.

COXEY UNDISTURBED BY ARMY DESERTIONS

CANTON, Ohio, April 17.—"General" Jacob S. Coxey professed to be undisturbed today by desertions from his army, which started from Massillon with 200 men on a march to Washington. When the hike was resumed this morning not more than 150 were in line.

The "army" spent last night in the socialist hall here. The "soldiers" were discontented and demanded food, but many of them went hungry to bed. It was reported that "General" Coxey, his wife and son dined at a good hotel. Prayer was offered by the Rev. Harry Wilson, the army chaplain, before the march was resumed today.
