### UP TO CARRANZA COMMENTS VILLA REGARDING WAR

TORREON, Mexico, April 18.—"It is a question," said General Villa today, "whether an American bombardment of Tampico to compel Huerta to apologize for an affront to the United States, would be construed as an act of war against the Mexican nation."

"If it should be so construed, the war being between two civilized countries, Americans in Mexico would be accorded the same protection as Mexicans in the United States. Of course, refer to non-combatants. But I don't believe the Tampico incident will lead to war."

"In the last analysis, so far as the constitutionalists are concerned, the matter is one to be settled by General Carranza."

General Angeles, General Carranza's war minister, said he did not think the constitutionalists would consider it their affair if the United States were to punish Huerta for insulting the American flag.
