TABLE ROCK TABLETS

Quite a number of cut-throat trout are being taken from the river by local fishermen. Spraying for codling moth is in progress here. Rev. M. C. Mae Nealon, who is teaching in the Meadows district, spent the weekend with home folks. Orchard inspectors are in this vicinity this week. A man came out from Medford on Monday and measured the water in the Table Rock ditch. Harry Hayes is at Gold Hill supervising the work on his mine near that place. The Table Rock ball team journeyed to Beagle Sunday and in a hard-fought game defeated the "Bangle boys", 12-13. At the school rally in Sams Valley Clark Collins carried off the prize for the best running jump, making nearly nineteen feet. He also proved himself the best tennis player. At a meeting of the tennis club last week it was decided to disband and sell its apparatus. There will be a school entertainment at the schoolhouse next Friday night. The Table Rock Improvement association was duly launched last Thursday evening with the following officers: President, E. W. Carlton; vice-president, M. Chase; secretary, Harry Wilcox. There is also a council, composed of these officers and two other members, the other two being R. C. Washburn and S. M. Nealon. The Needlecraft club gave an exhibition of their work at the schoolhouse Saturday night. A short musical program was rendered, after which some new members were taken into the club. Next in order was the viewing of the exhibits, which were really worth going miles to see. The walls were literally covered with the most beautiful needlework we ever saw, and reminded us of a fancy work booth at a state fair. Refreshments were served, after which a vote of thanks was given to the ladies of the club by the neighborhood.

COKER BUTTE CROAKS

The writer has been urged to act as correspondent for the Coker Butte section. While just at present a representative from this quiet district seems as unnecessary as a fifth wheel to a wagon, something might happen some day that would interest the readers of the Mail Tribune. To date there have been no murders, fires, divorces, wife beatings or other little happenings, such as daily occur in less favored sections, and from the character of the ranches surrounding Coker Butte, I fear, from a news standpoint, no such events will take place. However, should anything of general interest transpire, your correspondent will try to see that such happenings receive the attention they deserve. As a salutatory it might be well to voice the sentiment of those who are daily compelled to "bump the bumps" between Medford and the Phipps Bros. ranch over the Eagle Point road. This, a part of the main road to Crater Lake, is fairly good from the end of Roosevelt avenue to the bridge, just south of Brookhurst. Here is a bump and mudhole that has received no attention in two years. Two loads of gravel will make it all right. From this point, for about a mile, the road is in fairly good condition, but when one approaches the Bermuda ranch and from there to Oak Knoll it is simply a succession of mud holes, stones and chuck holes. I will guarantee that at fifteen miles per hour one cannot keep on the back seat of an automobile over this stretch, and the worst of it is that for two years practically nothing has been done to better conditions except on a short stretch of hill. Within less than two miles of this combination of holes and rocks used as a main thoroughfare from Eagle Point and Crater Lake to Medford, is a hill of the finest kind of road material which the county is using on other sections, and a few days' work would place the worst of this road in fine shape for summer travel. Now, Mr. Road Supervisor, if you read this, and I trust you will, don't think it is a thrust at you personally, for I do not believe you have to ride over this stretch as often as I, so do not realize its condition and how little work is necessary to put it in good order. PRESIDO TROOPS ORDERED SOUTH AND ON THE WAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 24.—"There is little to be said," briefly stated Brigadier General J. P. Pershing, commanding the Eighth Brigade, as he directed the operations of his troops today at the Presidio prior to their entraining this afternoon for the front. The cavalry came and we were ready. Shortly after the orders came last night the big military post took on a scene of activity unknown since the Spanish American war. Bugles sounded, orders were shouted and long lines of wagons rolled down the roads heaped high with supplies of war. By daylight the stores were being piled on board cars. Ammunition wagons, horses and ambulances were loaded as fast as the cars were switched in. At 11 o'clock most of the cavalry was still being held at the Presidio because of lack of cars but it was said the brigade would be on its way before night. Colonel Richmond P. Davis, commanding the coast defenses of San Francisco, arrived at the Presidio at 9 o'clock with a detachment of coast artillerymen from the Twenty Fifth corps to take charge of the Presidio during the absence of the Eighth Brigade.

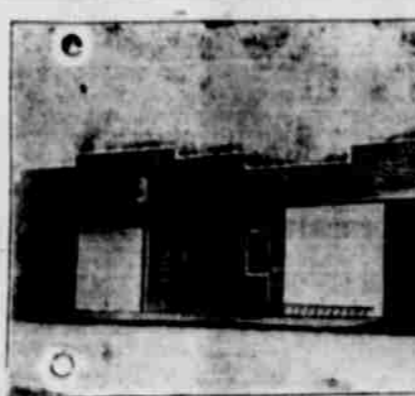

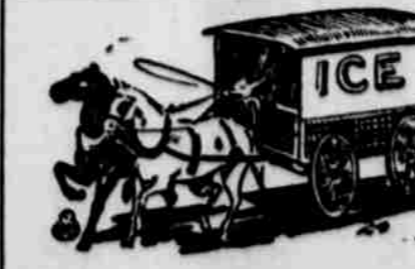

FIFTH BRIGADE BOARDSTRANSPORTS FOR VERA CRUZ

GALVESTON, Tex., April 24.—At 6 o'clock this morning the Fifth Brigade began boarding transports for the east Mexican coast. As soon as embarkation is completed the vessels will be ready to sail. The transport Kilpatrick probably will sail for Vera Cruz this afternoon and the others at midnight. With the Fifth Brigade will go the Sixth Cavalry, the Fourth Artillery and a battalion of engineers. The Twentieth Infantry was the first to get aboard the Kilpatrick. Numerous loads of equipment and baggage were brought to the vessel by mules and gangs of stevedores put the stuff aboard. At Fort Crockett, the camp debris was burned in huge bonfires. At 6 o'clock this morning, with the band playing "The Girl I Left Behind Me," the members of the Twentieth Infantry marched across the island in loose formation to the Kilpatrick.
