The concerto is a big number and was an admirable closing selection. Every child sooner or later must meet the problem and will obtain information from some source. The vital point is, that the source be right and the ideals high and the thoughts pure. The mother can help and must help if the best results are to be accomplished.

The State Social Hygiene Society is ready and anxious to give Medford the benefit of its experience and tired methods and Medford ought to help retain the leadership in this State wide constructive work. Societies will be organized in all cities of our State of over 2500 inhabitants.

It is urged that this splendid lecture be attended by every woman in Medford and it is very important that Greater Medford Club representation include every member of the Club. In the evening of the same day, Thursday April 30th. This will be a meeting and lecture in St. Marks Hall for the representatives men of Medford.

Mr. Daniel Toole, of New York City, who is to deliver his lecture on "The Destiny of Man," in St. Mark's hall Sunday, April 26, at 8 o'clock, is a very close student of industrial conditions, as well as a thorough Bible scholar. He is reported as saying:

"Speaking of the general unrest and the many remedies and cure-alls offered for the betterment of industrial conditions, men need to be educated. Two comprehensive truths should be carefully considered, all should learn that Natural Selection and The Universal Reign of Law control in our present social system, and that it is not in the power of man to change nature or nature's laws; and hence that it is impossible for him to do more than tinker present social conditions, and temporarily improve them a little. The new and more desirable laws necessary to the perfect, the ideal society, will require supernatural powers for their introduction and enforcement. Learning this lesson will help to bring 'Godliness with contentment,' while waiting for the Kingdom of God and praying, 'Thy Kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as in heaven.'"
