

# AWARD CONTRACTS FOR CALIFORNIA STATE HIGHWAYS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25.—Nine contracts for 53.6 miles of state highway under the \$18,000,000 bond issue were awarded yesterday by the highway commission, the awards being approved by the advisory board of the state department of engineering.

### The Highway Awards

The contracts were as follows: Asphalt surface, between San Jose and Mullin, John W. McDonald of San Jose, \$15,809; four and half miles concrete in Humboldt, near southern county border, Berry Mackie and Co., of San Francisco, \$45,097.12; four miles concrete work from Dearborn to the north line of Kern county, engineer's estimate, \$48,769, awarded to Lynn S. Atkinson of Los Angeles for \$48,110; highway in Alameda, from Haywards to Villa Vista school, engineer's estimate \$24,163, awarded to Dieslan Bros. of San Francisco, for \$19,538.11, five miles concrete work in San Diego county, from Los Flores west county line, engineer's estimate, \$74,852, awarded to W. A. Perry, Los Angeles, for \$69,935; two miles concrete work from East San Diego to La Mesa, engineer's estimate \$12,620, awarded to C. L. Hyde Construction company of San Diego for \$12,461.

### Bids Are Excessive

The state highway work between El Orondo and Placerville will be done by the day basis. The bids received yesterday were excessive and were rejected. Bids for 18.1 miles in Ventura, Solano and Tuolumne also were rejected. New bids will be called for 14 miles of highway in Merced county.

Contract for 5.1 miles of road in Alameda, engineering estimate \$59,732, awarded to Ransome-Crummey company of Oakland for \$53,263; five miles grading from Forsythe creek to Ridgewood, in Mendocino county, engineer's estimate \$59,223, awarded Hard Bros. of Sacramento for \$51,381.

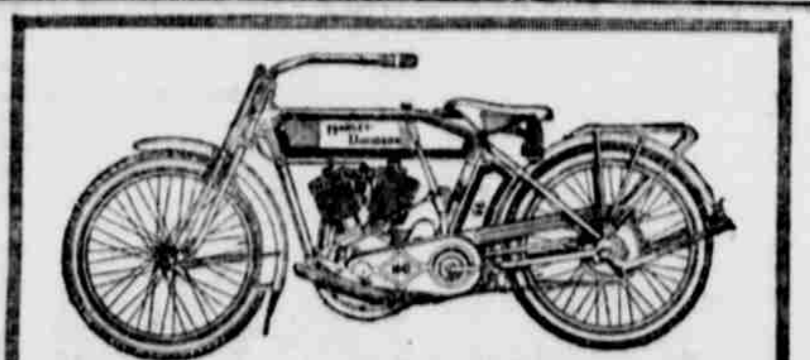
