

WILLIAMSON TO LECTURE TO LADIES ON SOCIAL HYGIENE

The most important meeting of the week coming under club events will be the lecture by Dr. W. T. Williamson, which will take place in the assembly room of the library, Thursday, April 30, at 3 p. m. under the auspices of the social hygiene department of the Greater Medford club.

Dr. Williamson is one of the best known doctors in the state and comes to us from the Oregon Social Hygiene society of Portland. He will speak to the ladies of Medford on Sex Hygiene and tell mothers, how they can best help to educate the child in the home. He will also tell the ladies something of what the Oregon Social Hygiene society is doing and the benefits that may be derived by co-operation. Societies will be organized in all towns of over 2500 inhabitants. Medford is one of the leading cities of Oregon and it is essential that her citizens shall help to retain the leadership of this statewide work, which is recognized as the strongest along this line, in the country.

Mothers often find themselves inadequate to deal with the problems which confront every conscientious mother, therefore some medium for the exchange of ideas and for self-culture would prove beneficial. Educated motherhood must come before educated childhood. The co-operation of all women of Medford is asked and all are invited to attend this lecture which is free. DENY INJUNCTION BLUE SKY LAW

PORTLAND, Or., April 29.—Following the denial by Federal Judge Wolverton of a petition by the National Mercantile company of Vancouver, B. C., for a temporary injunction against the operation of the Oregon "blue sky" law, a hearing on the constitutionality of the law before three federal judges will be held June 8. Circuit Judge Gilbert and District Judges Wolverton and Bean will sit en banc and hear the arguments.

In denying the petition for injunction, Judge Wolverton said: "I am convinced that the National Mercantile company, even if it does not fall within the jurisdiction of the 'blue sky' law, should qualify under the general laws of the state."
