Reports were read on Art, Conservation, Civics, Education, Home Economics, Legislation, Library, Music, Press and Public Health. Discussions following the reading of each report.

Dr. W. T. Williamson of Portland, from the Oregon Social Hygiene Society addressed the Convention. Dr. Bertha Stewart and Dr. Hodge of the State University, were also among the speakers. Miss Ida A. Keddar, librarian of the O. A. C. gave a most interesting address and Mr. Mickle, State Dairy and Food Commissioner discussed pure foods. Mrs. E. E. McKibben, chairman of Food Sanitation of the department of Public Health of the General Federation gave some valuable data and Mrs. F. E. Merrick, of Medford, 2d Vice-President of the State Federation, represented that Organization. Also splendid papers and talks by the president of each Club represented were listened to with great interest.

The Federation was organized in Ashland last fall. The first Annual Convention held in Grants Pass last week and it is expected that the next Convention will come to Medford. th, the session of the Southern Oregon District Federation of Women's Clubs was held in the Bethany Presbyterian church. Mrs. Clements of Grants Pass presiding. The first number on the program was a piano solo by Mrs. Vater, which was very much enjoyed. Mrs. Clements introduced Mayor McKinstry who welcomed the Federation to Grants Pass. Mayor McKinstry said:

"When I was younger I often wondered why the refining influence of women, so much in evidence in the home, was not used more in public life. Now that this influence is going out into public life we may hope to find conditions greatly improved. There is no courtesy too great to extend to the federation, which so honors Grants Pass."

The mayor was followed by Mr. Hipper, president of the Commercial Club. It gives me great pleasure to welcome the Federation to Grants Pass. This gathering represents all lines of progress, and will be a great factor in the improvement of civic conditions in Southern Oregon. This movement should be encouraged and great praise given the ladies for their enterprise and unity of action. Your work will make our cities the magnets for housekeepers. Now that women have an equal voice in the government, this convention should lead to better things. You can use your energies to secure tourists travel to our natural wonders, Crater Lake and the Natural Caves. It is with the keenest delight that I extend to you the welcome of the Commercial Club to Grants Pass.

In the absence of Mrs. Conklin, president of the Ladies Auxiliary, Mrs. McKibben of Grants Pass, chairman of the Food Sanitation Committee Department of Public Health, of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mrs. McKibben said: I bring you a message from the General Federation. Many men think Clubs, just give women a chance to show off. In fact my husband even says so. It is not true. Women are very much in earnest, and go to the heart of things. In the Saturday Evening Post some time ago I read an article on the Art of Discovering Club Women. The author had known Clubs in his Mother's day. She wrote essays on Browning and the meaning of Etruscan Art. He went to a New York meeting and found them talking on every up to date subject. As the Senator said, he did not know where he was at. This change is just the mother heart trying to make the world a fit place for the little child to live in. The District Federation of Southern Oregon will work with this object.

The Lawrence Orchestra gave two selections which were well rendered, and very much appreciated by the audience. Mrs. Gard of Ashland, acting president of the Federation, responded to the addresses of welcome. Mrs. Gard said: We greatly regret the absence, because of illness of Mrs. Conklin, president of the Ladies Auxiliary of Grants Pass. It was in a conversation she and I held that the Federation was born. We now represent a thousand women. In the country districts we have eighteen Parent Teachers Associations. They hold social meetings in the schools. The men say these meetings are their greatest financial asset, as women from the East refuse to move onto ranches where there are no social attractions. The Federation is going to work this year to perfect an organization for Girls, which will give them the same physical advantages from play that our boys have. We will beautify the

Pacific Highway with flowers and trees. There are no juvenile courts in Oregon, in Cities of less than 10,000 people. We wish to get them established in all cities. By carrying on the fly campaign we can advertise the Rogue River Valley as free from flies. The re-establishment of the Southern Oregon Normal is a project very dear to the heart of Ashland, for which the Federation will work.

Mrs. W. W. Walker entertained the meeting with a very beautiful vocal solo.

Mrs. Merrick of Medford, Vice-President of the State Federation, took the place of Mrs. Evans of Portland, who was prevented by an accident from attending. Mrs. Merrick said: "It was an accident sent me here in the place of Mrs. Evans. Great good will be accomplished by the work women's clubs are taking up. We are becoming acquainted with each other's work and needs. Now that we have the vote we should learn how to use it. In order to get results we must discuss questions of public interest and all work together. The State Federation has the same interests we have. We should let the people of the North half of the state know we will help them. Let the North half of Oregon and the South half of Oregon work together for the whole Oregon."

Professor Hull compared the glories of ancient Italy to those of the Italy of America.

The program closed with a piano solo by Miss Wolke, which was much enjoyed by all present.

Wednesday morning the session began with reports of all the Club Presidents, and of the Parent Teachers Associations. At 10:30 Dr. W. F. Williamson of the Oregon Social Hygiene Society addressed the delegates on the need of the education of parents in the work taken up by the Society.

In the afternoon Mrs. Kidder, Librarian of the O. A. C. delivered a most interesting address on "Children's Books." First the child asks for pictures, then for stories with rhymes and repetitions. Give them these. Buy for children beautiful books, that they may form sound taste in art. Fairy tales help to teach morals, if we omit the gruesome ones. Hans Christian Andersen is the best exponent of the Fairy tale. Boys enjoy ancient myths and these lead up to the great poets and essayists who used these myths as their subjects.

Miss Quinlan entertained with a very well rendered piano solo. She was followed by Dr. Bertha Stewart of the University of Oregon. Dr. Stewart advocated similar physical training in games and sports for our girls and boys. Women in their life work need steady nerves and girlhood is the time to attain them. We could reach our ideal in this if our girls were let go on playing until through college, and not repressed with a thousand don'ts. Dr. Stewart was followed by Mrs. Hobart, of Grants Pass, Federation, Chairman of Household Economics. Mrs. Hobart deplored our lack of progress in household arts, as compared to the great development in mechanics in all other lines. If Grandpa came back he would not know his farm; but Grandma would be right at home in her old dingy, inconvenient kitchen. Mrs. Hobart was followed by Mr. Gregg, superintendent of the parks of Grants Pass, who told the delegates how to improve the appearance of their lawns and gardens, and to avoid common mistakes in planting shrubbery.

Miss Baron, Domestic science

teacher of the High School followed with a paper on the proper feeding of infants and young children.

Mr. Mickle, State Dairy and Food Commissioner explained the use of preservatives in the canning of food and the common tricks by which the housekeeper is deceived. This closed the afternoon's program.

The closing session of the Southern Oregon District Federation convention was held in the Commercial club rooms at Grants Pass Thursday morning, April 30th at 9 a. m. The routine of business was gone over and the treasurer's report read and accepted.

The report of the committee on constitution and by-laws was not submitted, it being decided by the convention to hear the report at a later meeting.

Mrs. C. L. Schiefelin of Medford, chairman of resolutions, presented the following resolutions which were adopted.

Resolved, That the First Southern Oregon District Federation endorse the work of Dr. W. T. Williamson and committee of twenty-one which he represents, on sex hygiene and pledge their support to the furtherance of the cause.

Resolved, That the District Federation endorse the state food and dairy commission and pledge the support to their legislative measures.

Resolved, That the District Federation shall devote its efforts to improving the laws concerning the property rights of women and the rights of women in the control of their children, and also to the passage of uniform marriage and divorce laws in all the states.

Resolved, That the District Federation go on record as protesting against the "funny page" which comes with the Sunday papers, and that we do all in our power to improve those having direction and control of children that something better can and should be substituted. We consider that the pages in question are neither humorous in the best sense nor artistic in any sense.

Resolved, That the Southern Oregon Federation of Women's clubs go on record as supporting the action of the general federation in the movement to have women immigration inspectors stationed at all ports where women and children are received, also we will endorse any legislation that will lead to placing of same at all Oregon ports.

Resolved, That the Federation impress upon the minds of its members the importance of being informed on all political questions of the day and in registering and performing all civic duties.

Resolved, That the District Federation extend its thanks to Dr. Bertha Stewart for her helpful suggestions regarding the physical training of our young girls, and go on record as approving her ideas and offering her our support.

Resolved, That the Federation endorse the state food and dairy commission, and pledge its support to their legislative measures.
