

CHICAGO BOARD OF EDUCATION SENT TO JAIL 30 DAYS

CHICAGO, May 4.—Having disregarded an order by District Judge Foell for reinstating four members of the local board of education, who had resigned, eight other members of the same body were sentenced today to thirty days each in jail for contempt of court.

GAME ENTHUSIAST BROKE GAME LAWS

Zeigler testified that he bought the guns from a man by the name of Williams, whom he met riding through the woods, for \$7. Zeigler was identified by W. E. Ewing as the man who sold the guns to him for \$15, giving the name of Charles Williams.
