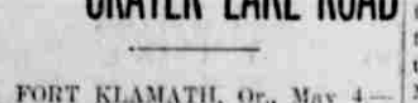

STEAM SHOVELS FOR CRATER LAKE ROAD

FORT KLAMATH, Or., May 4.—That the work on Crater Lake national park highways is to be rushed this season with a vim is shown by the arrival of three new steam shovels to be used there.

One of these big shovels will go direct to the road in the vicinity of the government headquarters; the other two are for use on the road being constructed in the Sand creek section.

Engineer Sparrow is now on the ground assembling tools and men preparatory for the summer's work. Engineer Goodwin, who was in charge of the work last season and who will be again this year, is expected to arrive by May 15.

ANDERSON SCHOOL ENTERTAINS WAGNER

Friday, May 1, Miss Ruth Wilson's school of twenty pupils from Anderson creek arrived at the Wagner creek school in a hay rack with colors flying and school yells resounding. A short program was first held, the chief number being a dramatic court scene, "The Trial of the Fly," which had been cleverly originated by Mr. Wheeler, principal of the Wagner creek school.

An oral arithmetic match was won by Wagner Creek, while in a written match that followed, Anderson Creek scored the highest. Miss Pearl Withrow carrying off the honors. A Babcock milk test by Supervisor Chase was then given and eight samples of milk were tested from as many different farms.

ASHLAND WINS MEET; MEDFORD SECOND

The Southern Oregon High school meet was held at Ashland Saturday afternoon, Ashland winning with 43, Medford second with 41 points, and Grants Pass 6 points. Ashland's strength lay in the long runs, Medford winning in the dashes, weight throwing, Gates, Baker, Grey, and Pelouze, were the individual stars for Medford.

Pelouze won the fifty and one hundred dash with Burdick of Ashland second and Wiles of Grants Pass third. Burdick of Ashland won the mill run from Grey, of the local team by a slim margin. Freeman easily won the mile with Wiles second. Gates scored first places in both the pole vault and weights. Baker and Wiles tied for the high jump. Pelouze won the running broad jump, distance 16 ft 3 in.

The relay was won by Ashland, Burdick running last, with Medford second. No official time was kept. A large number from Medford attended.

The three schools will meet in this city some time in the near future and if the meet proves a success, it will be made a yearly event and will be called Medford Day.

BISHOP SCADDING DISCUSSES NEW CHURCH WITH PARISHONERS

Sixtieth Anniversary of Episcopal Church in Oregon to Be Celebrated by Special Services in Autumn—Class of Fourteen Confirmed—New Site for New Church.

Bishop Scadding made his official visitation of St. Mark's Episcopal church on Sunday, and confirmed fourteen persons. The bishop spoke of his appreciation of the spiritual and missionary work being carried on under the Vicar Rev. W. S. Hamilton, and of the loyalty of the congregation and special efficiency of the Woman's Guild.

The bishop spoke of the St. Mark's flock as being one of the best buildings for stores and offices in Medford, and that it had been built entirely by money raised outside of Medford. Money raised in Medford had gone into the stone basement and foundation of the proposed church building.

It was not worthy of the beautiful services, or of the church people in Medford, that they should worship much longer in this upper room in a business block, besides the space was needed for rental as a hall or for offices. Forget the block and business he said and start anew. Raise money and build a church and parish house for a moderate sum; and when business revives an endowment may be expected from the block in the future.

Sixtieth Anniversary This year is the 60th anniversary of the Episcopal church in Oregon and it will be celebrated by special services, and entertainments in Medford in the early autumn. The celebration in Portland will take place June 2nd with a men's dinner at the University club, and will continue until Trinity Sunday, June 7th, when offerings will be taken in all the churches for the Bishop Morris Jubilee fund for church extension in Oregon. The growth of the Episcopal church in Oregon, especially during the past eight years, has been substantial. The missions in all the important towns are striving towards self-support and to maintain resident pastors.

The life of the church in Oregon really began in 1851, when a service was held in Portland by Rev. William Richmond, who came to Oregon from New York by the Isthmus of Panama on a leave of absence. But the official church was not created until 1854, when Rev. Thomas Fielding Scott was named as the bishop of Oregon, Washington, and Idaho. There was not a single mile of railroad in all that territory. Oregon, City in August of that year.

The first convocation was held with three churchmen present. Bishop Scott died in 1867, following a highly successful episcopate. Rev. B. Wister Morris was elected bishop in 1868, and had charge of the work in Oregon and Washington. He died at the age of 86 years on the eve of Palm Sunday, 1906.

Diocese of Oregon

The diocesan convention elected Rev. Charles Scadding bishop in 1906. The general convention of 1907 made Eastern Oregon, a missionary district, and by this act, the diocese of Oregon was limited to the part west of the Cascade mountains.

The present diocese of Oregon is twice the size of the diocese of Ohio and has 13 self supporting parishes and 36 missions. In 1906 there were 15 clergymen and at the present time there are 20. The Bishop Morris jubilee fund is a permanent fund created at the fiftieth anniversary celebration in 1904. The interest alone can be used for church extension, and at present there is \$2000 in it. A plan is under way to increase this to \$10,000, and it is planned to do much towards this during the week's jubilee that comes early next month.
