relish being attacked for extravagance by Mr. Madden's supporters because they complied with Mr. Madden's urgent requests.

The Tax Question

"The county taxes are but a trifle lighter than those of a year ago. The increased taxation is due to a quadrupled state tax and higher city and school taxes. The slight increase in county tax, less than half a mill, is due to the necessity of redeeming outstanding warrants if the county is to reduce its old indebtedness and maintain its credit.

"The county is being run upon a business basis. Our income is greater than our expenditures and we are effecting a reduction in the vast indebtedness we inherited. Former administrations made a small tax levy and plunged the county heavily in debt. That is not our way. We found county warrants discounted 10 per cent and have forced them up to par.

"In December last year we twice

published in advance our budget for the coming year, showing itemized estimates of expenses. The public was given twenty days' notice for protest. If any one thought the expenditures contemplated were too great, they had the opportunity to appear before the court and protest—show where we could get along for less money and still carry on a program of progress. No one protested.

Results Obtained

"County taxes are no higher in Jackson county than in other counties—not as high as in many. The court will be pleased to learn about the extravagance alleged, other than expenditures necessitated to save the orchards from destruction by blight, which soon cease. Roads are in better shape and more satisfactory road work is being done for less money than ever before. All county departments are efficiently managed.

"The county court makes its mistakes, but endeavors to rectify them when made. There may be better men found than the present members, but few will care long to stand the continual abuse and malicious slanders and lies we have to put up with. Particularly do we dislike being assailed for the things that we have done, only at the behest of the assailants.

"Our record is an open book. All our actions and every penny spent are published in minute in the newspapers of the county."

YOUTH CONFESSES GRAFTING PUBLIC ON MAGAZINE SWINDLE

Don Woods, age 17 years, an orphan since he was nine, utilized educational ambitions to molest the public on a magazine subscription swindle, according to a confession he made to Prosecutor Kelley. He was bound over to the grand jury this morning before Justice of the Peace Dux. Woods received his education in the Y. M. C. A. of Portland.

Woods' plan was to call upon a citizen, and outline an attractive offer. The agent that secured the most subscribers would receive a scholarship in the University of California at Berkeley. The one aim of his life, he told his victims, was that scholarship and a chance for an education. The kind-hearted fellow, D. C. Webster, one of his alleged victims was suspicious of the tale and reported his suspicions to Prosecutor Kelly, who made an investigation. It resulted in the arrest of Woods, who later made a full and complete confession, showing that for ways that are dark and tricky that are smooth, the magazine solicitor is peculiar.
