

MOTHER TONGUE OF FOREIGN WHITE STOCK IN OREGON

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 15.—The English and Celtic (including Irish, Scotch, or Welsh) group was the largest among the 238,239 persons of foreign white stock in Oregon in 1910, who represented 26 per cent of the total white population of that state, according to the mother tongue bulletin which has been issued recently by Director William Harris of the Bureau of the Census, department of commerce. By mother tongue is meant the native language, or that spoken before immigration, and the report covers all white persons of foreign stock, including the foreign born and also the natives, one or both of whose parents were foreign born. As thus reported, the total foreign white stock whose mother tongue was English and Celtic (including Irish, Scotch or Welsh) numbered 81,262. This number represented 12 per cent of the total white population of Oregon, which was 655,090. The German group numbered 70,967, or 11 per cent, the Swedish, 20,374, or 3 per cent; the Norwegian, 13,920 or 2 per cent; the Danish, 7436, or 1.1 per cent; the French, 7128, or 1.1 per cent; the Italian 7098 or 1.1 per cent; and the Finnish, 6890, or 1.1 per cent. The number of persons in Oregon of foreign white stock reporting other principal mother tongues were: Greek, 3960; Polish, 2663; Yiddish and Hebrew, 2345; Dutch and Frisian, 1973; Bohemian and Moravian, 1769; Serbo-Croatian, 1469; Slovenian, 1089.

In the city of Portland the English and Celtic (including Irish, Scotch or Welsh) group of foreign white stock numbered 22,815, or 16.5 per cent of the total white population, which was 138,952. Those reporting German as their mother tongue numbered 28,721, or 14 per cent; Swedish, 8929, or 4.5 per cent; Norwegian, 5077, or 2.6 per cent; Italian, 3596, or 1.8 per cent; French, 2749, or 1.4 per cent; Danish 2415 or 1.2 per cent; Yiddish and Hebrew, 2041 or 1 per cent; Polish, 1729 and Finnish, 1468. The total foreign white stock of Portland numbered 74789 and represented 48 per cent of the total white population of that city.

STATE MAY AID IRRIGATING VALLEY

GRANTS PASS, Or., May 15.—Valuable water filings made by W. B. Sherman at Hell's Gate, Jump-Off Joe creek and Graves creek, including valuable reservoir sites, and by Claud E. Selleck at Taylor Creek canyon, will be assigned to the state of Oregon upon recommendation of State Engineer John H. Lewis, for the purpose of securing engineering data to determine the most feasible and economical irrigation plan for the lower Rogue River valley, including the Merline district. State Engineer Lewis was in the city yesterday and drove over the district for the purpose of securing first hand information with the foregoing results. Mr. Lewis gave encouragement for state and federal aid in the project. The information given by Mr. Lewis is that the state will provide a plan by which irrigation can be secured at actual cost and that the payment will be extended over a long period of years with interest not to exceed 4 per cent. Each land owner will be notified by the government as to the actual cost of his irrigation before he is required to mortgage his land for one penny.

ZAPATISTAS ATTACK CAPITAL SUBURB

VERA CRUZ, Mex., May 15.—Creditable private advices from Mexico City report that the federals at Topilejo, eighteen miles south of the capital, were attacked yesterday by the Zapatistas. No details of the fighting were received, but the incident is regarded as an important development by authorities here.

Topilejo has been the scene of numerous clashes during the last few months, and the engagements are usually indecisive, since the federals never attempted to follow the retreating Zapatistas. It is not considered that the new activity there indicates any intention of a Zapata attack on the capital, as the reported agreement between Zapata and Villa to move jointly against Mexico City is credited here.
