

BEN LINDSEY TO TELL PRESIDENT OF LUDLOW HORROR

CHICAGO, May 19.—Judge Ben Lindsey of Denver and five women from Colorado passed through Chicago today on their way to Washington to beg President Wilson not to withdraw the federal troops from the strike zone. Judge Lindsey asserted that civil war would result if the regulars were replaced by militiamen.

In the Lindsey party are Mrs. Lee Champion of the Colorado women's relief committee and the following women who passed through the battle at Ludlow: Mrs. Mary Petrucci, who lost three children in the death hole; Mrs. Pearl Jolly and Mrs. M. H. Thomas, with her two young children. Mrs. Lindsey was taken ill here and will not complete the trip.

TALENT TO HOLD FARMERS' INSTITUTE

TALENT, May 19.—On May 28 and 29 there will be held in Talent an institute for farmers, fruitgrowers, gardeners, poultrymen, etc., five professors and instructors from the U. S. C. at Corvallis will be present. Professors Lewis, French, Pitt, Lunn and Bouquet. These men are all specialists in their different lines and will give addresses on horticulture, dairying, alfalfa growing, poultry raising, gardening, etc.

A session will also be devoted to speakers from different points in the valley, Ashland, Medford, Central Point, Talent, Phoenix, and any persons who have interesting items of practical experience are invited to participate. Each of the college instructors will at the close of their lecture give opportunity for questions and general discussions will be conducted.

It is hoped that a large conference of farmers from the entire valley may be assembled and an organization effected to arrange such meetings as annual or semi-annual events, meeting at the different towns of the valley and bringing together those interested in these affairs. The Talent band will entertain the occasion with music.

LEPER ESCAPES FROM QUARANTINE STATION

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Officials of the United States public health service were exercised today over the escape reported last night of John H. Early, the leper, whose case has attracted public attention for several years, from the Diamond Head quarantine station near Port Townsend. William Early was traced to Victoria, B. C., but was believed to be on his way to this city, where he once was confined.

"The escape of Early," said Surgeon General Blue, "again demonstrates the necessity for a national leprosy hospital, where patients can be properly cared for and safely guarded."

1200 CHILDREN IN ONE CHICAGO BLOCK

CHICAGO, May 19.—Twelve hundred children in one block were found this week by school census enumerators. This is believed to be the prize baby block of Chicago, if not in the world.

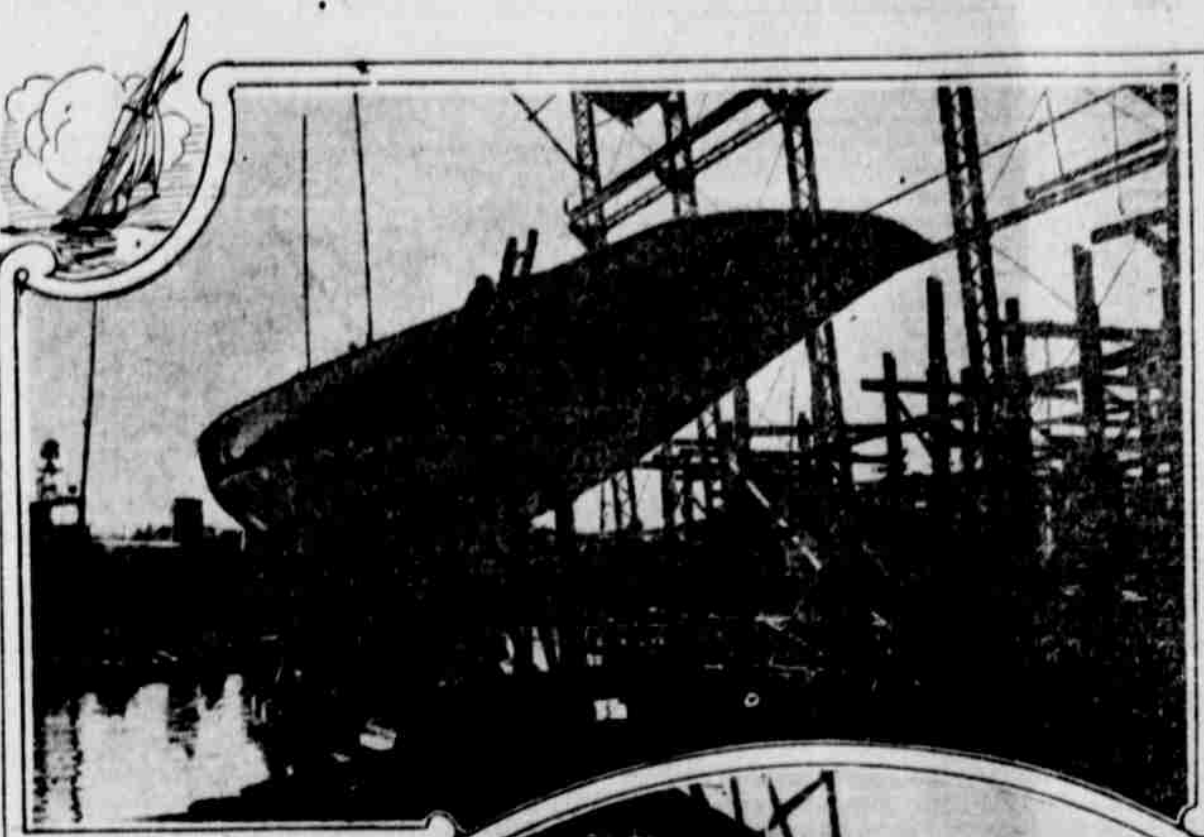

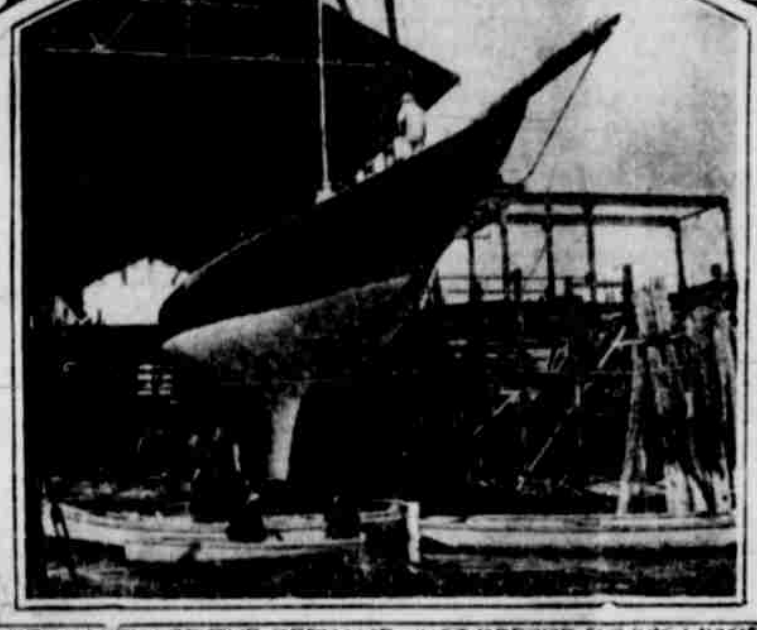

FORMER ADVISOR OF HUERTA IN JAIL AT SANTA CRUZ

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Brigadier General Funston, in a report to the war department today, confirmed stories of the arrest of Dr. Aurelano Urrutia on his arrival at Vera Cruz, from Mexico City, and added that he would be kept under guard until he goes aboard his ship. General Funston did not say when Dr. Urrutia intends to embark or whether he is bound. He said that Antonio Rivero del la Torre, editor of El Dictamen and leader of the demonstration against Dr. Urrutia, probably would be released from custody today.

VERA CRUZ, May 19.—Dr. Aurelano Urrutia, ex-minister of the interior, declared that he left the capital because he feared assassination and in the belief that a revolt would shortly occur in the City of Mexico.

"I left the capital," he said, "for two reasons. The first was a knowledge of a plot among General Huerta's close political supporters to assassinate me, they saying I knew too much. Second, there had been planned a general revolt of the people and the army."

"I would not be surprised to receive now at any minute news of an uprising against Huerta, whom the people and the army are tired of and of whom the people and the army are determined to rid themselves. I did not want to be in Mexico City when this occurred."

Twice arrested and hustled through the streets by American soldiers and hissed and stoned by his countrymen Urrutia was forced to face yesterday some of the indignities to which he subjected others while he was high in power at the capital. He expects to sail for Europe at the first opportunity.

ANOTHER MINISTER OF HUERTA'S RESIGNS

MEXICO CITY, May 19.—Considerable interest is displayed in the news of the resignation of Jose Maria Lozano, minister of communications and public works, which has just been announced. No reason is assigned for Lozano's resignation.

A train came in from San Luis Potosi last night but it brought no Americans. This was a disappointment as it was expected that the American vice consul at Saltillo, John R. Stillman, would be aboard.

FEDERAL FORCES SEIZE OIL FIELDS

WASHINGTON, May 19.—That federal soldiers still control Panuco, 30 miles inland from Tampico, as rumored late yesterday to Rear Admiral Mayo, was confirmed today in a report from American Consul Miller to the navy department. An entire garrison which evacuated Tampico when the constitutionalists took the city, is said to have ceased flight at Panuco, where extensive oil wells are located. Concern is aroused

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TEDDY ARRIVES FROM LONG TRIP IN SOUTH AMERICA

NEW YORK, May 19.—From the steamship Aidan, nearing this port with Theodore Roosevelt aboard, came a wireless message today saying that Colonel Roosevelt's health was greatly improved, and that within a short time he would deliver a lecture on his explorations in Brazil before the National Geographical society at Washington.

The Aidan, it was reckoned, would reach quarantine about 4 p. m.

NEW YORK, May 19.—Theodore Roosevelt will get home from his South American exploration trip late today.

The colonel's friends will not have a chance to greet him if the plans of his family are carried out. They have arranged to have a strictly family party meet him at quarantine with a tug and take him to Oyster Bay, where he will be landed at the private pier of his cousin, W. Emlen Roosevelt, only a short distance from his home. Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., and W. Emlen Roosevelt will make up the family party.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., May 19.—At the request of Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt the plans of the villagers of Oyster Bay to welcome their townsman, Theodore Roosevelt, have been postponed for at least 24 hours. There was to be a parade tonight, but the decision to bring the colonel by yacht put these plans away.

Now it is planned to have Mr. Roosevelt dine with his family at Sagamore Hill tonight, if he feels well enough tomorrow evening go down to the village. Then the villagers hope he will make a brief address.
