

BETTER FOOD, BETTER HOMES WEEK FOR MEDFORD WOMEN ARRANGED BY MAIL TRIBUNE

Miss Florence M. Peet, Famous Expert, to Teach Women Scientific Principles as Applied to Practical Cookery Methods—Will Be Here All Next Week and Give Instruction in Housekeeping—National Movement Strikes Medford.

An event of unusual interest is promised for the women of Medford to take place the week of May 25. This is to be a better foods, better homes campaign carried on by one of the leaders of the better foods, better homes movement. This movement is an old one in a new setting. Popular Lecturer Coming

A small group of thoughtful, intelligent women have taken this matter up in earnest and are presenting the Better Foods Better Homes movement to the housewives of every city in the country. One of the most successful of these women is Florence M. Peet, domestic science lecturer and food expert. She has been conducting Better Foods Better Homes campaigns in many California cities this season, and those who attend her lectures and cookery lessons are most enthusiastic in their praise of her and her methods, as well as of the delicious foods she prepares. Miss Peet has been secured by the Mail Tribune to conduct a five-day home economics school in Medford, which will be entirely free to all women interested in better foods and better homes. The school will begin on Monday, May 25. Domestic science as applied to practical housekeeping and everyday cookery will be demonstrated by Miss Peet. Many conservative housekeepers throughout the country who have felt that domestic science was too complex and impractical for everyday use have been converted in its favor by Miss Peet's reasonable and simple explanations and practical suggestions. She has helped thousands of women to better, easier

housekeeping methods and better cooking. She is an experienced housekeeper, thoroughly acquainted with all the latest and most approved housekeeping and cookery ideas, and presents these in an interesting, workable manner, which appeals to inexperienced and experienced housekeepers alike.

Has Original Recipes

There is every reason to believe that the school to be held here next week will be a rousing success. Medford women are famously good cooks and are deeply interested in the best and most up-to-date cookery methods. Miss Peet has been studying and traveling for a number of years in the interest of better foods and better homes and brings new ideas for food and food preparation to present to those who attend her school. She has many new and original recipes which will be of particular interest to the best cooks in Medford. She will make ice cream, make the kind of doughnuts for which she is world famous, and the sort of pie crust that is dainty and tender and at the same time wholesome and digestible.

Is Popular

Miss Peet attracts great crowds of women wherever she lectures. The idea some people have that the majority of women care for nothing but dress and society and the newest dances is absolutely refuted wherever Miss Peet conducts a course of home economics. From the crowds of women who flock to hear her lecture, it would seem that the greatest interest women have is how best to make and keep the home and how to prepare the most nourishing and palatable foods for their family. Miss Peet says that to the woman who has this ambition and chooses proper foods and cooks them well, a knowledge of food values is most profitable; it will enable her to provide good meals for her family at a minimum expenditure of time and labor and money. She says that when women realize that food is intended to build up and repair tissue and is a sort of fuel on which the working efficiency of the body is dependent, they will study this matter thoughtfully and intelligently. Miss Peet explains all this in a simple, helpful manner, interesting and entertaining to the woman who has studied domestic science, as well as to those who have not. She is constantly studying up new ideas to the end that even her most excellent cooking may be made better. She says this idea holds good in every field of art and science. "Why, then," she asks, "should we be content with antiquated cookery methods?"

SPANGLE ROBBERS ELUDING POSSES

SPOKANE, Wash., May 20.—Hunt for the three desperadoes who locked the cashier of the State Bank of Spangle, Wash., in the vault and escaped with between \$4000 and \$5000 was resumed at daybreak today. Darkness stopped the posses from pursuing last night nine hours after the bandits had left the bank.

The men are supposed to be, in hiding in the timber along Hangman creek, in the vicinity of Waverly, Wash. O. W. Newton, cashier of the bank, who was locked in the vault, returned from the man hunt last night and said this morning that he will devote the day to checking up the bank's money. The three bandits were unmasked and looked like boys when they entered the bank.

CARSON TO LECTURE AT WILLOW SPRINGS

As Mr. Carson is the owner of the famous Redland vineyard in the Applegate valley, which he operates in connection with an alfalfa and stock farm, he is well qualified by experience to talk on the lines indicated. WEST PROMISES STATE AID FOR JACKSON ROADS

SALEM, Ore., May 20.—In a statement issued today Governor West said that the highway commission had not declared its intention of giving state aid only to counties issuing bonds, but that all counties contributing to the highway fund were entitled to share in its benefits. The governor says:

"The highway commission has not declared its intention of giving state aid to counties issuing bonds. All counties contributing to the highway funds are entitled to share in its benefits. Counties have a right to build roads without bonds if they see fit."

"It is the commission's desire, however, to put the limited amount of money at its disposal into roads at an early date, and to this end it desires to build through co-operation in several of the counties demonstration roads. It is not likely, however, that many counties other than those that have issued bonds and thus have funds on hand will be able to cooperate with the state just at this time. In time both the state and other counties will have additional funds and further co-operation will be possible."

"The state is constructing a stretch of road in Sherman county and has declared its willingness to cooperate with Washington county in the construction of a permanent section of the Hex-Tigardville road. Neither of these counties have issued bonds. The bonded counties which have funds on hand and are in position to cooperate at this time are Jackson, Clatsop and Columbia."
