

KRUTTSCHNITT AND SPROULE PRAISE THE ENTERPRISE SHOWN BY THE PEOPLE OF SOUTHERN OREGON

**Southern Pacific Chiefs Say That
More Optimism Exists on Coast
Than in East—Many People Com-
ing to San Francisco Fair—Jack-
son County Road Building Praised.**

SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the executive committee of the board of directors, Southern Pacific company, who passed through San Francisco late last night on his way to Del Monte, says there is a much more cheerful attitude on the Pacific coast with regard to financial conditions than in the east and middle west.

"The feeling," said Kruttschnitt, "is undoubtedly due to the fine crop prospects in California and Oregon; railroads and other industries have had a hard time of it for the past year. Earnings have dropped off so sharply that all roads have been obliged to curtail their expenditures for new improvements and betterments. This curtailment in turn has reacted on other lines of activity by lessening the demand for lumber, structural steel and building materials in general. I could not but note on my way west the proportionate increase of west-bound shipments, which shows that no one is ordering beyond his immediate needs, so that I am indeed pleased to find things hopeful out here in California.

Expect Big Fair Traffic
"We are expecting a great many people to come from all parts of the country to visit the Panama Pacific exposition, and the Southern Pacific is doing everything it can to advertise the fair through the east. I am told that while much publicity has been given the exposition in the west, there is need of greater effort throughout eastern states. We are getting our equipment in shape and perfecting plans to adequately take care of the vast throngs expected. President Sproule tells me that Vice-President Scott has issued orders to increase the hours of our car shops employees, so that from now on they will be working full time. As business prospects grow better we shall undoubtedly make further additions to our forces."

Asked regarding plans in connection with the Central Pacific dismemberment suit, Mr. Kruttschnitt replied that the Southern Pacific has filed its answer at Salt Lake City, and was awaiting further action by the United States courts.

Conditions in Oregon
"My visit here is of no special

significance. Am merely making one of my regular inspection trips over the property. I am glad to be back in California and to greet my friends and acquaintances and play a game of golf at Del Monte."

Kruttschnitt will spend tomorrow on the east side of the bay inspecting the subdivision and other Southern Pacific properties in Alameda county. He will leave Friday evening for Del Monte and remain there until Monday.

Southern Oregon's Activity
President Sproule, who, with Vice-President W. B. Scott and E. G. McCormick, accompanied Chairman Kruttschnitt, said: "I joined the party at Sacramento on my way home from a ten-day trip through Oregon. In Oregon I found the same healthy crop conditions that obtain in California. There will be an abundance of all products except prunes, of which there will be a short crop in both states. While the railroads will suffer from this prune shortage, I believe that so far as the growers are concerned, the higher prices will tend to offset the smaller quantity."

Southern Oregon's Activity
"Southern Oregon is waking up to its opportunity very rapidly. Ashland is holding an election to bond the city for \$175,000 to construct a resort, hotel, cottages and golf links. As the location is one of the most beautiful in the country, the scheme will give the visitor for health or recreation the benefit of hot and cold springs, splendid shooting and some of the finest fishing in the world. Jackson county is spending \$800,000 in highways and automobile roads. This is of interest to California because it helps in the work the latter is doing to make a great north and south highway from southern California through the central and northern parts of the state into Oregon, connecting a continuous chain of pleasure resorts that will make California and Oregon a playground for the whole continent."

"Medford being just across the boundary from California, its activities are of interest. An example of the Oregon spirit was shown in Medford when a citizen with his own money built a theater accommodating 1200 people. On the opening night recently the people of the town, as a testimonial to the builder, filled every seat in the theater at \$5 a head. This means simply that the good work which is being done in California is also being carried on in Oregon."

"Business and commerce in general in Oregon is in a condition of serious depression, just as it is in California."

SUFFRAGETTES ON RAID

The scenes at Box street police court when the women arrested during yesterday's battle were arraigned today surpassed in wildness a previous effort of the militant party. A male suffragist, who somehow had found a perch among the rafters, blew ear-piercing variations of the "Marseillaise" on a cornet and then sounded the "charge." This was a signal for volleys of bags of flour and other missiles to be thrown at the magistrate, Sir John Dickinson.

Three policemen were required to prevent one of the prisoners from throwing herself over the rail of the inclosure. Another woman removed her shoe and hurled it at the head of the magistrate, who caught it deftly in his extended hand.

When Sir John Dickinson suspended the hearing and ordered the court cleared, there was a free fight.

Refuse to Keep Peace
Subsequently the women were again brought in. Most of them were bound over to keep the peace for six months, but they unanimously refused to find sureties.

Theophile O. Grandpre of Chicago, who was knocked unconscious by a mounted police's horse during the suffragette raid on Buckingham palace, told the police today that he was robbed of \$250 by two men who came to his assistance.

The perpetrator of the suffragette outrage at the Royal Academy, when brought up at the police court, gave the name of Mary Spencer. She was committed for trial at the sessions. Addressing the magistrate as a "hump-tious old Pontius Pilate," she accused him of the proceedings lively with an abusive tirade.

\$200,000 LOSS BY FOREST FIRES NEAR VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 22.—Estimates up to noon today place the loss from forest fires in the neighborhood of Vancouver at \$200,000. Eight cottages and a shingle mill have been burned at North Vancouver, where a blaze is sweeping up Grouse mountain. A special steamer with government fire fighters aboard was sent today to Shumon, forty miles north of Vancouver, to combat a blaze in great timber limits.

Fire close to Dewar's gravel pit, between Port Comitlam and the Coquitlam Lake dam, had already devastated an area about five miles long and two miles wide, containing valuable timber; has destroyed two lumber camps and is still burning fiercely. The logging camp of Mr. Daynor was completely wiped out. Buildings and all the other buildings were lashed up by the flames in a few minutes, leaving the men of the camp and their families homeless. The refugees fled to Port Comitlam and Port Moody. An exciting train was made with a train of flatcars drawn by an engine from the Dewar gravel pit to the dam through the fire zone. On the cars were many women and children picked up at points in the flame-swept district.

KONG FOUND GUILTY OF WOMAN'S DEATH

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 22.—At the conclusion of the most dramatic trial in Vancouver's history, Jack Kong, the Chinese servant, aged 16, accused of the murder of Mrs. Charles Millard, wife of a Canadian Pacific railway employe, was found guilty of manslaughter. Sentence was reserved.

The jury was out from noon until seven o'clock and then the court adjourned until 8 o'clock. At 9 a. m. the verdict was rendered.

Kong, in evidence explained Mrs. Millard ran at him with a knife because he had cooked the wrong kind of porridge for breakfast one morning.

He took up a chair, hit her with it as he was afraid she was going to kill him and then when she fell he thought she was dead and cut up the body, burning it in the furnace of the house."

SNIDER INSTALLS MECHANICAL MILKER

J. W. Snider has just installed a new Sharp's mechanical milker, which was purchased through W. L. Chappell of the Medford creamery. This machine will milk six cows at a time and draw milk from all four teats at once, therefore being able to milk twice as fast as six men milking by hand. The machine is adapted for milking 125 cows with sufficient power and equipment for fifty cows more by the addition of two more units, which can be supplemented at any time as the herd is increased. The cost of the present installation is \$1200.
