Miss Peet and Her Cooking Popular—Hall is Packed to Overflowing—Baked Ice Cream Tonight—This Afternoon's Lecture Was on Varied Menus.

A special lecture and cookery demonstration of the series being conducted by Florence M. Peet under the auspices of the Mail Tribune, in St. Mark's Hall, will be held tonight and it is anticipated that it will be a great success. At the session of the school tonight Miss Peet will bake ice cream. This seemingly impossible feat has been accomplished by Miss Peet many times, so she has no fear of failure whenever she tries it. Many men as well as women are eager to see her perform this remarkable cookery stunt tonight. With her baked ice cream she will serve a very fine mocha cake.

Made Fine Pastry of the This afternoon's session of the Mail Tribune Home Economics school was even better in point of attendance and enthusiasm than yesterday's. It was attended by a very large crowd of the best housewives of Medford, who are all delighted with Miss Peet and her methods, as well as with the foods that she prepares and serves. The lecture this afternoon on "Varied Menus" was intensely interesting, and note books and pencils were much in evidence, as Miss Peet suggested ways of varying the three meals a day without increasing their cost or adding to the labors of the housewife. She suggested that women keep a record of some of their most pleasing menus to be used in a different form at another time. She made a lemon-coconut cake which was a beauty and proved when eaten to be just as good as it was pretty. Miss Peet explained how cakes can be made just as well without butter as with it, and will doubtless make cake-baking more popular in Medford than it has been since the price of butter has

been so high. Another excellent suggestion demonstrated by Miss Peet was in the pastry line. She showed how to make the kind of pie crust that is light and tender and flaky, and easy to digest. Miss Peet also made Saratoga chips according to the frying methods which she discussed yesterday and elaborated upon today. She surely knows how to fry foods in a thoroughly digestible manner, and many Medford families who have been deprived of fried foods because the housewives considered them indigestible, will now be treated to some of these dishes.

### Success of School Assured

The Mail Tribune Home Economics school is a most successful undertaking. Many women who attended yesterday and today have expressed their determination not to miss a single session. Miss Peet is enthusiastic and inspires her audience until they are as full of enthusiasm about

domestic science and scientific housekeeping and pure foods as she is. Miss Peet has been a lecturer, demonstrator for a number of years and fully understands how to handle a large audience and make everybody happy. Miss Peet said today that she is extremely glad to note the number of young girls who are attending the Home Economics school. She is a firm believer in domestic science, which she says is merely another name for home science, and she says that she finds this growing more popular wherever she goes. She insists that the young women of today are more scientifically interested in housekeeping and cookery methods than women have ever been before, and that they are going about studying these in a most intelligent manner, and will no doubt make even better housekeepers than their mothers and grandmothers. Miss Peet's hobby is good food, well cooked.

On Wednesday Miss Peet will prepare and serve the following menu:

- French Fried Potatoes
- Currant Tea Ring
- Lemon Tart
- Macedoine Salad
- Salad Dressing

Any who have not heard Miss Peet up to this time cannot afford to miss the session tonight, while those who have heard her are sure not to miss it.

### Fried Cornmeal Nut Cakes

Two cupsful yellow cornmeal, 2 table-spoonfuls melted crisco, 3 cupsful boiling water, 1 teaspoonful salt, 1 egg, 1/2 cupful chopped nut meats.

Bring water and salt to boil, stir in cornmeal, add nut meats and stir and cook ten minutes. Remove from fire and add egg well beaten, and melted crisco. Turn into criscoed tin and cool. When cold, slice and fry in hot crisco. Serve with honey or maple syrup. Sufficient for six or eight slices.

One and one-half cupsful flour, 1 teaspoonful salt, 1/2 cupful crisco, 4 table-spoonfuls water.

Sift the flour and salt and cut the crisco into the flour with two knives until it is finely divided. Then add the water sparingly, mixing it with a knife through the dry materials. Form into a dough, roll out on a floured board, about one-quarter inch thick. Use a light motion in handling the rolling pin and roll from the center outward. The crisco should be of a consistency such that when scooped out with a spoon it rounds up egg-shaped.

## M'NARY LEADS BENSON 18 VOTES ON OFFICIAL COUNT

PORTLAND, Or., May 26.—The official count, as received from various county seats in Oregon, and tabulated here today, gave Charles L. McNary a plurality of eighteen votes over Henry L. Benson, in the republican primary contest for nomination for supreme court justice. Complete unofficial returns recently gave Benson a small plurality. Benson's supporters were still hopeful that the official tabulation at Salem would restore his lead over McNary.

One egg, one cupful dark brown sugar, 1 cupful milk, 3 table-spoonfuls flour, 2 table-spoonfuls crisco, 3 table-spoonfuls water, 1/4 teaspoonful salt, 1 table-spoonful powdered sugar, 1 baked crust, 1 teaspoonful vanilla extract.

Put yolk of egg into saucepan, add brown sugar, flour, milk, water, crisco, salt and vanilla. Stir over fire until it thickens and comes to boiling point. Pour into baked pie shell. Beat up white of egg, then beat powdered sugar into it. Spread on top of pie and brown lightly in oven. Sufficient for one pie.

### Jelly Roll

Four eggs, 1 cupful sugar, 2 table-spoonfuls melted crisco, 2 cupsful flour, 1 teaspoonful baking powder, 1/4 teaspoonful salt, 4 table-spoonfuls milk, jelly or preserves, 1 teaspoonful lemon extract.

Beat eggs and sugar together for twenty minutes, remove beater, sift in flour, salt and baking powder, add milk, extract and melted crisco. Grease large flat tin with crisco, dust over with flour, pour in mixture and spread out evenly. Bake twelve minutes in moderately hot oven. Turn out on sugared paper, spread quickly with jelly or preserve and roll up at once.

The cake will crack if spreading and rolling are not quickly done. Sliced jelly roll is delicious with custard. Sufficient for one jelly roll.

## BORAH PAINTS GLOWING FUTURE FOR REPUBLICANS

DETROIT, Mich., May 26.—A glowing picture of the future of the republican party reunited with the progressive element which left in 1912 was painted here today by Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, speaking at a statewide "conference" of republicans.

"The republican party," said the senator, "is coming back into power. The proof of it is on every hand. The trend is unmistakable. I said a year ago that the amalgamation which would take place would be an amalgamation of the voters, not the assumed leaders. I said furthermore that that was the only amalgamation that was worth while. The men who voted the third party ticket to the number of four million for reasons entirely satisfactory to them, can neither be questioned as to their integrity nor their patriotism, but that it was a protest and not a manifestation of purpose to permanently leave the party is now established by facts and figures which cannot be doubted.

### Duty Before Party

"Now in view of this pronounced and unmistakable purpose of those who voted the third party ticket to ally themselves with the republican party, in view of the determination to support its principles and its policies, what is the task before us? It is unquestionably to make our party equal to the tremendous problems which now concern us. It is to build up in this country, out of the traditions, the achievements and prestige of the past, the duties and obligations of the present and the hopes and aspirations of the future, an organization efficient, militant and progressive—worthy of its old days and equal to the obligations which now rest upon us. It is our duty, in other words, in unmistakable terms, to make it clear that the republican party is to be as it was in its best days, a thoroughly progressive party. We ought not to assume for a moment or concede for a moment that because the party bids fair to go

back into power, there is going to be any compromise with the forces which brought it near its ruin. There is in this country a powerful influence for the bad in politics, and it will take possession of any party in the world, if it can, which is enjoying power. This kind of an influence does not fight a party in the open. It holds itself in readiness to direct the course of any party which happens to be its power. With such influences there can be no compromise if we are to have a party which is going to meet and solve the great problems which a new industrial and new social conditions have imposed upon us.

"No man living in this splendid age, and these exhilarating environments, can afford to permit the corroding poison of pessimism to enter his soul. But, on the other hand, the curse of our age is that cold, cruel, selfish conservatism which, living in its ease and comfort, enjoying its wealth and all it brings, refuses to

see or sympathize with the conditions of those who, in the midst of a world of plenty, are bordering on the line of hunger and misery, who refuse to see the new conditions or the new problems which must be met and dealt with in the same spirit and with the same courage and progressiveness that our fathers met the problems of their age. This great and all-encompassing task, my friends, is not the gathering of wealth, but its fair and equitable distribution.

"What we want in this country is a party which will do the simple but profound thing which Lincoln did—that is, gather up the common sense, the common honesty, the common patriotism, the common courage and the common righteousness of the common people of this country and organize it into a militant, progressive, disciplined force for legal and social justice, and do it all under the constitution and laws of this blessed old republic."
