PROTESTANTS WARNED AGAINST CATHOLIC CHURCH

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 26.—The Southern Presbyterian assembly today adopted the following resolutions following addresses from a number of speakers attacking the Catholic church: "The general assembly views with serious concern the growth and poisonous activity of that powerful politico-religious organization known as the Church of Rome, which is and always has been a menace or a blight to civil and religious liberty of every kind wherever it has obtained a foothold; that it views with serious concern the dangerous spathy pervad-

ing all classes of Protestants in this country regarding this menace. "It was made plain during the debate that the objection of the Presbyterians to Catholicism is not against any spiritual doctrine or action directly connected with it, but with what the speakers termed "political activity of the Catholic church."

Those who spoke on the subject before the resolution adopted included the Rev. J. S. Lyons, of Louisville, Ky., and Dr. J. Addison Smith of Murfreesboro, Tenn. Dr. Smith charged that "an edict from the pope was found on the body of Major Butt who died on the Titanic, commanding all Catholics to vote for a candidate other than Woodrow Wilson in the presidential elections. Dr. Smith said he recently served on a committee which appealed to the Associated Press for wider publication of general church news and that the efforts of the committee were futile.

FRENCH SERUM CURE-ALL FOR CONTAGIOUS DISEASES

PARIS, May 26.—A discovery which in the opinion of scientists may lead to the preparation of serums conferring immunity from many of the contagious diseases was communicated to the Academy of Sciences tonight by Prof. A. d'Aronval, member of the Institute and of the Academy of Medicine. It is the result of several years experimentation of Dr. J. Tissot of the Natural History Museum on the constituents of serums. For many years the unknown substances in serums which has been made a toxin, and which has the property of destroying pathogenic germs of neutralizing their effects, has been the object of minute investigation but its nature was never determined until Dr. Tissot succeeded in analyzing the substance and ascertaining the effect of each element contained in it. The knowledge thus attained it is believed will make possible the preparation of more effective serums.
