CARRANZA MAY BE REPRESENTED AT CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Representatives of the constitutionalists here took steps today to reopen the question of representation at the Niagara mediation conference. John Lind and C. A. Douglass, legal representative of the constitutionalists, held what was termed a neutral conference early today and later went to the state department to take up the subject with Secretary Bryan, who had gone to the capital to confer with senators of the foreign relations committee. Their conference with the secretary was on that account deferred until later in the day. Today's development, which undoubtedly was one direct outcome of long conferences General Carranza has been holding over a special telegraph wire with Emilio Zuberan, his minister of the interior, in charge of the constitutionalist agency here, was pointed out as justifying the optimism of the last day or two in official circles. Colonel Roosevelt expected to return to his home in Oyster Bay late in the day.
