ORCHARDISTS' MASS MEETING SATURDAY

The special committee of orchardists is appointed at a mass meeting held some time ago, for the purpose of investigating various applicants for the position of county pathologist and adviser, and reporting their investigations and recommendations back to a later mass meeting. A meeting today and decided to call a mass meeting of orchardists for Saturday, May 30, at 2 o'clock p. m., at the public library in the city of Medford, in which meeting their recommendations would be formally submitted for action.

This is probably one of the most important meetings of orchardists that has ever been called in this valley. It affects materially the welfare of every orchardist. The special committee, shortly after its appointment, had a formal meeting with the county court, and the county court stated to the committee that they would adopt such measures within reason in regard to the office of county pathologist and adviser, as the orchardists in a representative mass meeting might indicate. It is therefore very important that as large a representation as possible attend this mass meeting, and that a thorough consideration of the subject be had at such time. The committee cannot urge too strongly upon every orchardist the advisability of attending the meeting.

MILLION DOLLAR MORTGAGE FILED

A million dollar mortgage was filed Wednesday by the Rogue River Public Service Corporation, covering property in Jackson and Josephine counties, to the Fort Dearborn Trust & Savings bank and Ernest C. Glenn of Chicago, as trustees for bondholders. The property comprises the Golden Drift or Ament dam and other property formerly held by several defunct corporations, including water rights, filings and plants at Gold Hill and Rogue River and the irrigation system below the Ament dam and other property.

The corporation was organized by George E. Sanders and has for its object the construction of power and electric plants, irrigation systems and other public enterprises.
