forenoon. Though the water is still icy, the temperature today was not low enough to increase the suffering of the survivors.

The vast number of the saved were members of the ship's crew. Early estimates here indicated not more than sixty passengers were saved. Besides Captain Kendall, the first and second engineers and the ship's surgeon were rescued. The captain was too overcome to give at first any extended account of the disaster. He had sent a wireless in his line after the vessel was struck saying, "Ship gone."

WITHIN NINE MILES OF CRATER BY AUTO

Seeley Hall, Homer Rothermel and E. D. Weston returned this noon from a trip to Crater Lake, in an attempt to reach the lake in a Hippobile car. They worked their way to within four miles of the famous scenic spot, left their auto in a snowdrift and walked to government headquarters. The lake with the snow on all sides; in its winter garb, was a sight the three declare, never to be forgotten. Seeley Hall, who has viewed the lake hundreds of times, says it was as much different from the summer season, as night from day.
