

MEMORIAL DAY EXERCISES HELD AT PAGE THEATRE

Medford will pay its annual tribute to the soldier dead and living of the Civil war tomorrow. The Memorial day exercises, under the auspices of the G. A. R., will be held at the Page theater. The Merchants' association of the city this morning issued a notice to all its members to close their stores between 2 and 4 o'clock p. m., that all may give fitting observance to the memory of the heroes and show that patriotism is not dead.

The exercises at the Page theater will be preceded by a parade of the old soldiers, with the National Guards, Elks and other fraternal orders, in the line of march. Attorney R. E. Mulkey will deliver the address of the day at the Page theater.

The day being a legal holiday, all public offices and banks will close. Oney Patton, secretary of the Elks' lodge, has issued a notice requesting that all members meet at the lodge hall at 1:30 and march to the Page theater with the veterans. The public library will be closed all day.

MINING ENGINEER VISITS SOUTHERN OREGON

R. E. Bennett of Denver, traveling correspondent for the Engineering and Mining Journal of New York and a mining engineer of considerable note, stopped off in Medford yesterday and spent a few hours with some of the local mining men.

Mr. Bennett has recently passed through the war ridden zone of Northern Mexico and states that it will be a year before mining can get started in Mexico again while on the other hand there is rapid improvement in the mining outlook in Western America.

Criticizing mining as it is conducted in many parts of the West, he stated that if mine owners and operators would employ technically trained mining engineers more, there would be less money lost and fewer mistakes made. Mining, he says, has come to be a scientific business and that all the losses that have ever been experienced in mining have originated in trying to treat it as otherwise.

He arranged with one of the local mining engineers to write a series of articles on the Mines of Southern Oregon, for the journal which he represents.

STORES CLOSE DURING DECORATION DAY CEREMONY

The Post and W. R. C. will meet at I. O. O. F. cemetery at 9:30 a. m. when they will proceed to decorate the graves of all soldiers buried there, will then return to Post hall for dinner. All schools and fraternal orders and military organizations will meet with us at the public park at 1:15 p. m. where the parade will be formed by West Lawton, marshal of the day, and march to the Page Theater where there will be an interesting program by the W. R. C. after which there will be an address delivered by Hon. E. F. Mulkey followed by some remarks by Professor Beveridge. There will be music and readings through the exercises.
