

MEXICANS FIRE UPON STEAMERS AT ACAPALOGA

ON BOARD U. S. S. CALIFORNIA, Mazatlan, Mex., May 28 (via wireless to San Diego, May 29).—Reports have reached the American fleet here of attacks on steamers in the harbor of Acapulco by Mexicans. The violence appears to be the work of Indians who have a habit of firing recklessly at the shipping in the harbor. Conditions at Acapulco are described in information conveyed to the American admiral as deplorable.

The Japanese merchant vessels Seyo Maru and Kiyu Maru have left Manzanillo, where it was reported that they had landed munitions of war for Huerta. The Seyo Maru sailed for Salina Cruz, the western terminus of the Tehuantepec railroad, and the Kiyu Maru for Honolulu.

The gunboat Annapolis, ordered to the mouth of the Yaqui river after the French colony at Santa Rosalia had advised Rear Admiral Howard that Americans were in danger of an Indian uprising, has reported that peace and quiet prevail in the Yaqui country and that the sixty-two Americans living in the valley have refused to leave their homes. Word was sent to them through the constitutionalist lines that any assistance needed would be afforded them at once.

BLACK DEPRAVITY SHOWN IN CASE

Depravity—100 per cent hideous—was revealed this morning in the testimony before Probation Judge Tou Velle in the cases of the three children of Mrs. David Pope, age 8, 10 and 12 years, who were paroled to the custody of their grandmother, Mrs. Hoxsey of this city. District Superintendent J. D. Cain of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society of Portland, declared it to be the worst case that ever came under his notice.

The three children have been with their grandmother for the last three months, during which time it was testified the mother contributed \$4 towards their support. The grandmother wrote the daughter she would have to take steps towards more support, or the children would be sent to the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, whereupon Mrs. Pope came to this city and took the children to Roseburg, where they were found by Superintendent Cain.

The diseased condition of the children from the testimony adduced, revealed an almost unbelievable condition, their future health being menaced by the wanton cruelty, according to the mother, of a rejected suitor.

Mrs. Pope testified that she was an actress and a nurse, and that she had been forced into a life of shame by her husband, early in her married life.

CARRANZA COMPLAINS LACK OF INVITATION

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Juan F. Urquidí, secretary of the constitutionalist agency, left for Niagara Falls during the night, bearing General Carranza's latest communication complaining of the action of the mediators in not asking him to send delegates.

CABINET TALKS PEACE PROGRESS

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The latest development in the Mexican situation apparently was not construed here as affecting the success of the negotiations. Secretary Bryan and other officials, as they entered the white house for the cabinet meeting, declared the situation was still "progressing satisfactorily."

Constitutionalist officials still maintained the position that should delegates go to the Niagara conference they would consider only the external affairs of Mexico.

Secretary Bryan and Secretary Daniels both said they still were without information of the reported landing of the large cargoes of the Ypiranga and Bavaria at Puerto Mexico.

The cabinet discussed the exchange of messages between General Carranza and the mediators at the Niagara conference, but all the secretaries declined to comment on them. Secretary Bryan would only say that he had "nothing official" on the departments.

FORMER SOLDIER HANGS FOR MURDER

GLOBE, Ariz., May 29.—William Stewart, a former United States soldier, was hanged here today for participation in the murder of Alfred Hilpot and Fred Kibbe, merchants, several years ago. He collapsed on the gallows and had to be supported until the trap was sprung.

J. B. Goodwin, another discharged soldier involved in the crime, was executed several months ago. Hilpot and Kibbe were murdered while on a hunting trip. The motive was robbery. Goodwin and Stewart appealed to several courts and finally to the president, for clemency, which was denied.

MEXICANS JOYOUS OVER PEACE TALK

MEXICO CITY, May 29.—Unusual activity in official circles of the capital is reported. Ministers of war, public instruction and finance, the acting minister of foreign affairs and the general treasurer of the republic conferred with Provisional President Huerta at 6 o'clock.

The German minister, Admiral V. Hiltz, also called later at the national palace.

It is believed the international situation was discussed at these conferences.

The inhabitants were jubilant on learning of reports about an early settlement between Mexico and the United States, and that the American troops would soon evacuate Vera Cruz.

AURORA AND CANBY POSTOFFICES ROBBED

AURORA, Or., May 29.—Not satisfied with the loot they obtained early today from the postoffice at Canby, Or., which they entered early today, robbers came to Aurora and robbed the postoffice here. They obtained here more than \$1000 worth of stamps.

The robbers also took from the Aurora postoffice a book of money order blanks. From the Canby postoffice their haul amounted to about \$10 in money and some money order blanks. That they did not get more was due to the fact that the Canby postmaster kept his supplies in a bank vault. The robbers escaped without leaving a tangible clue.

PRINCESS DORRIC WINS \$25,000 LADIE'S DERBY

EPSOM, England, May 29.—J. B. Joel's Brown filly, Princess Dorric, won today the Oaks Stakes, known as the "Ladies' Derby." Lord Carnarvon's Wassilissa was second and Sir John Thursby's Torchlight third. There were 21 starters.

The Oaks has been run every year since 1779. It is an event for three-year-old fillies, and is valued at \$25,000. The course is 1 1/2 miles in length. For this year's race there were originally 300 entries.

BEARS BADLY SQUEEZED CHICAGO WHEAT PIT

CHICAGO, May 29.—The chief concern caught short in corn today at the end of the May delivery was the interest that had virtual command of wheat and had permitted an easy settlement. In corn, no apparent consideration was shown, and in the end prices seemed to be put up without mercy.

The market for corn closed at 7 1/2c for May, an advance of 3/4c per bushel, compared with last night.
