DURANGO, Mex., June 4.—The towns of Tautima and Tautostan, in the state of Vera Cruz, have been captured by a force under General Carrido Aguilar, newly named governor of that state, according to a message received today by General Carranza.

General Aguilar has occupied a large portion of the country, has established civil and military authorities in office and offered full guarantees to commerce and industries.

HUERTA'S PRICE FOR RESIGNATION

Dictator Wants All of His Acts Since Seizure of Presidency Legalized—Seeks Protection for Own Future and That of His Followers.

VERA CRUZ, June 4.—The price Provisional President Huerta demands for his resignation is the legalization of official acts since his appointment to the provisional presidency, according to advices today from the capital.

It is said to have the proposal General Huerta authorized his delegates to offer at the mediation conference at Niagara Falls.

General Huerta is said to realize he has only a slim chance of winning out, but he is understood to be determined not to abandon power without adequate provision being made for the protection of his own future and for that of the men with whom he has surrounded himself.

ALAMILLO'S REBELS CAPTURED COLIMA

ON BOARD U. S. S. CALIFORNIA, Mazatlan, June 4.—Colima, capital of the state of that name, and one of the most important cities in southwestern Mexico, has fallen into the hands of the constitutionalists, led by General Alamillo, former governor of Colima, according to official information furnished Rear Admiral Howard today by a constitutionalist officer of high rank.

General Alamillo has been operating near the city of Colima. It has been known, for some time, preparatory for an assault.

Colima is a strategic point of considerable importance in the campaign of the west coast. It is but thirty miles east of Manzanillo, one of the four most important seaports on the Pacific side, and controls not only the back country to Manzanillo, but also communication between that city and the capital. It is on the Colima river, in the heart of a fertile valley. The population is around 25,000.

WINTERS TO STAND TRIAL FOR CONSPIRACY

NEWCASTLE, Ind., June 4.—Dr. W. A. Winters, his wife and W. H. Cooper must face trial for conspiracy to commit a felony, according to Judge Edward Jackson of the circuit court, who today set their trial for July 10. Prosecutor Myers was in court and no effort was made to quash the indictment against the three who were accused of connection with the disappearance of Catherine Winters, 9 years old, about a year ago.
