

REBELS REACH GUADALAJARA

Command of General Obregon Completely Shuts Off City From Capital on East and Coast on West—Junction With Villa Planned.

MAZATLAN, June 3.—Guadalajara, the objective point of the recent operations of the constitutional army of the northwest, under command of General Obregon, has been effectively surrounded. Three columns of Obregon's army, according to official information reaching Admiral Howard, have succeeded in shutting off the city from the national capital on the east and Mazatlan and the Pacific coast on the west.

The isolation of Guadalajara was accomplished by the simultaneous movement of three forces, commanded by Generals Diegues, Buelna and Lavigia. General Diegues, swinging southward upon Mazatlan, has cut the railroad and telegraph communication between Guadalajara and that port. His objective point is Mazatlan.

General Buelna has marched northward on San Marcos, the western terminus of the railroad running west from Guadalajara toward the Pacific coast of the state of Jalisco. He has intercepted all communication between Guadalajara and that territory, according to reports. General Lavigia is operating east of Guadalajara, and is reported in possession of the railroad connecting that city with the Huerta capital.

It is understood here that General Obregon's advance with combined forces of approximately 10,000 upon Guadalajara will be timed so as to meet General Villa's troops, headed southward, in a combined attack on Mexico City.

LIPTON'S SHAMROCK UPON TRIAL SPIN

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., June 4.—Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's new challenger for the America's cup, went out today for her first sail stretching spin in the vicinity of Spithead. She was accompanied by Shamrock III.

The wind was light and fluky and inadequate to test the capabilities of the challenger. Under her huge mainsail and her sloop foresail she maneuvered handily, however, and picked up way quickly after tacking. The towering mast of the new yacht dwarfed that of the old Shamrock.

HEAVY DAMAGE BY SOUTH DAKOTA STORM

WATERTOWN, S. D., June 4.—A severe wind storm did \$25,000 to \$50,000 damage in this section last night, according to reports received today. The storm was the sequel of the hottest early June day on record—88 degrees.

SEEK ROOSEVELT AS A CANDIDATE

NEW YORK, June 4.—State leaders of the progressive party met here today to discuss the approaching state campaign and the attitude of Colonel Roosevelt toward state and national political affairs. Theodore Douglas Robinson, state chairman, summoned the members of the advisory board of the state committee and George W. Perkins, executive chairman of the national committee, was here to consult with them.

Notwithstanding Colonel Roosevelt's declaration before he sailed for Madrid, that he would not be a candidate for governor this fall, some of the state leaders today expressed the belief that his decision was not final. The meeting today also faced the problem of what action to take should District Attorney Charles S. Whitman, now formally in the race for the republican gubernatorial nomination, seek progressive endorsement.

"Developments during the next few weeks will determine Colonel Roosevelt's attitude toward the gubernatorial nomination," said Frederick M. Davenport, who ran for lieutenant governor two years ago on the progressive ticket.

\$100,000 FOR CRATER LAKE PARK

WASHINGTON, June 4.—It is understood that two Oregon items introduced by Senator Chamberlain already passed by the committee and included in the sundry civil bill which will be reported next week, are \$100,000 for Crater Lake and \$15,000 for the improvement of the Clackamas salmon hatchery. The item of \$207,000 for Tillamook harbor, it was learned definitely today, will not be in the bill, owing to the fact that the engineers decided the money would not be needed and therefore did not include it in their final estimates. The Tillamook item will go into the bill to be reported in December, it is expected.

TOUCH OF JANUARY EXPERIENCED IN JUNE

Shivery weather following on the heels of the heat waves Saturday and Sunday, sent a shiver up and down the Rogue River valley today and caused a switch to winter clothes, and the appearance of overcoats and sweaters. The maximum temperature Wednesday was 66 degrees, and the minimum 45, typical readings for January.

At noon a bathstorm prevailed in the Big Sticky district, and at 10 o'clock hail fell in Medford and vicinity. The hail was of a soft composition, locally, and it is not thought

to have been hard enough to cause any damage. The weather bureau predicts warmer weather for Friday, which will likely bring showers.

MAKES COMMISSION MOST POWERFUL

WASHINGTON, June 4.—"In this bill the Inter-State Commerce commission practically is given the powers of general managers and of the boards of directors of all the railroads of the country," said George F. Brownell, vice-president of the Erie, testifying today before the senate inter-state commerce committee on proposed anti-trust legislation which affects railroads.

"Under this bill," continued Mr. Brownell, the commission would have the powers without the responsibilities, leaving the owners with the responsibilities and without the powers. It would lead to an interlocking directorate more vast than has been suggested as existing today."
