WISCONSIN FLOODS ENDANGER GREENWOOD

GREENWOOD, Wis., June 5.—This town and others along the Black river were in danger today of being swept away by a flood. The waters swollen by the heavy rains of last night and Wednesday have torn the municipal light and power company's dam from its anchorage and swept away 250 feet of concrete levee. Many families have been driven from their homes. At Heintz, four miles from here, the roller

mills of the Wishee Lumber company have been torn down by a bursting dam. At Oron, fifteen miles north, four feet of water is swirling through the streets.
