

NEW VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ELECTS OFFICERS

A new volunteer fire department was organized Thursday evening for the purpose of assisting the paid department, in case of a second alarm. The following officers were elected: J. E. Dent, president; G. F. Lindley, vice president; H. T. Huswell, secretary; Seely Hall, Asst. Secretary-Treasurer; G. F. Lindley, Foreman; J. E. Dent, asst. foreman; E. E. Eads, Sergeant At Arms. Trustees, J. H. Butler, E. E. Eads and Rankin Estes.

The members issued the following statement:

"The last three fires have demonstrated the need of some drilled volunteers with some experience in handling fires that are not afraid to take hold and go ahead, regardless of any conditions which might exist. The business men have expressed their desire of a drilled volunteer department, being organized to protect their property. It has been the gossip of the street, that the old company struck for phones, which was the common expression used, and which was not the case. The council cutting off the phones had nothing to do with their disorganizing. In fact only a few of the boys had phones paid for by the city in the first place, several of them that had the alarm system for night calls always did pay for their own phones even though they were installed mainly for fire service. Therefore, we desire to make it plain to the public, that we do not ask any little petty thing of this kind to be held as a byword, by the citizens or newspapers and for the gossip of the streets. We do not ask anything of the council that would not tend to make more protection for the citizens. It has also been stated that we are organizing to get free phones, which it not the case. We ask nothing of the city council, but we are organizing for the protection of the property interests of the citizens of Medford. We hope that our action will meet the approval of the public."

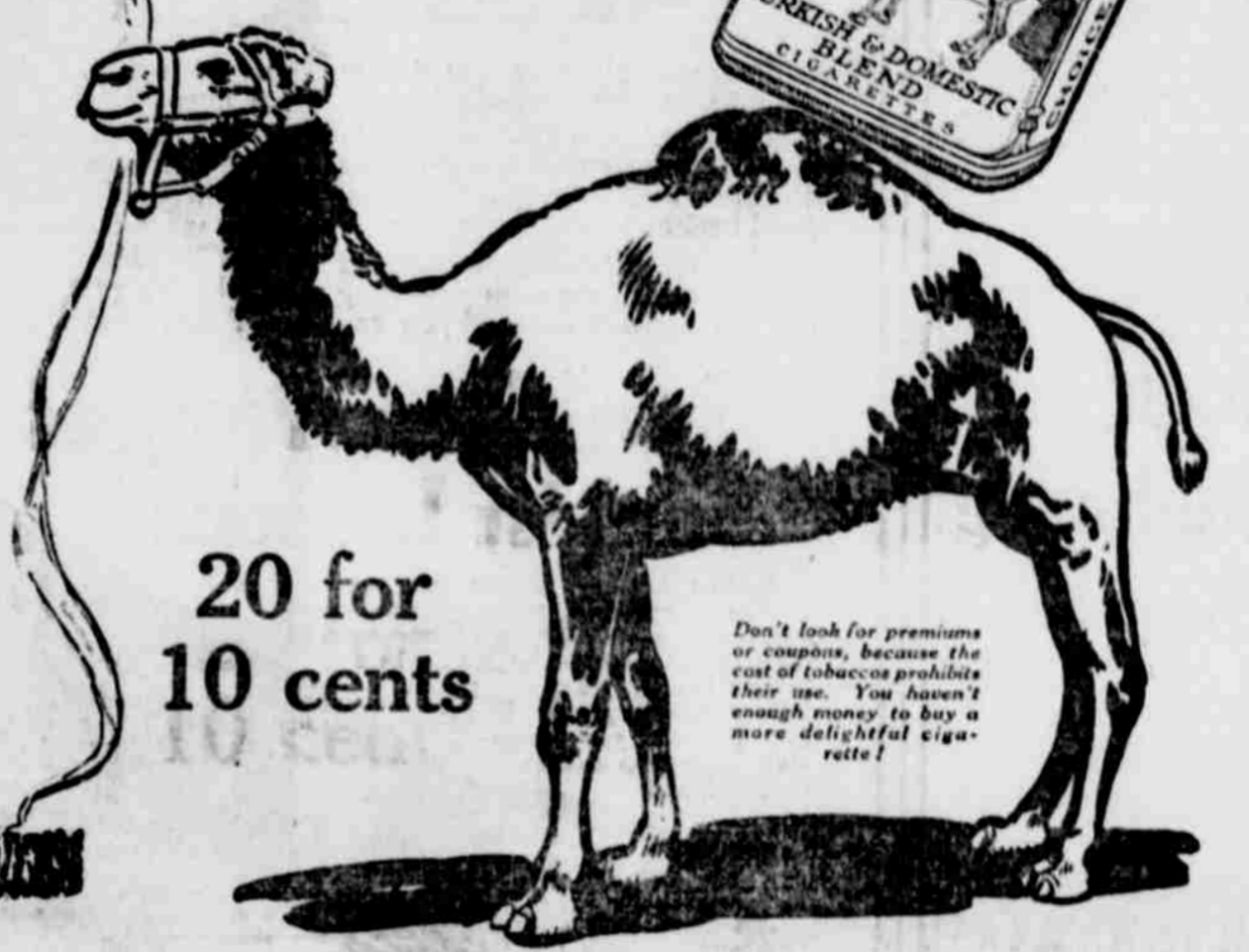
