

## MAUSER RIFLES FOR ULSTER VOLUNTEERS

BELFAST, June 5.—The army of the "Ulster Volunteers" was strengthened today by the addition of 2000 Mauser rifles, as the result of a daring gun-running feat of an Irish yachtsman.

A portion of the consignment was handed to the south of Donaghadee 10 miles from Belfast, but most of the rifles were delivered straight on the quay at Belfast and the cases were removed under the eyes of the police by specially selected volunteers.
