IRRIGATION PUMPS STARTED AT GOLDEN DRIFT DAM

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 6.—The pumps at the Golden Drift dam were started yesterday morning. The water is now being pumped into the north side ditch, which covers the acreage in the Jones creek district and land north of the city. Water users, through their committees, consisting of C. C. Gillett, C. R. Fifield and A. L. Bocoek, have charge of all water rentals and pay the Rogue River Public Service Corporation for pumping and distributing the water on a flat basis. Robert McNutt is in charge of the ditch and the distribution of the water and Pete Jensen and Jim Mannel operate the pumps.
