## HOUSE TO ACT ON CONSERVATION BILLS PREPARED

WASHINGTON, June 1.—A special rule for consideration in the house of the administration conservation program, consisting of five bills, was voted out of the rules committee today. A special rule for consideration of the Hobson prohibition amendment was not acted upon when the committee adjourned until later.

The committee agreed to hear Representative Hobson and the Rev. Dinwiddie, legislative agent of the Anti-Salon League, before voting on the rule. In the committee there was no effort to force a vote. Anti-prohibitionists in the house say the necessary two-thirds vote to pass the amendment could not be secured at this time. Majority Leader Underwood said if a vote was delayed how it would probably not be reached during the present congress.

The conservation program arranged in the special rule includes:

The Ferris bill for leasing of coal lands in Alaska, with six hours' debate.

The Foster radium bill, with four hours' debate.

The bill extending paying periods under reclamation projects, with two hours' debate.

The Ferris bill for conservation of water power sites on public lands with four hours' debate.

The Foster bill amending the mining laws with four hours' debate.

All of the bills on the program have been approved by the administration.

## CONGRESS SOON TO VOTE UPON DRY LAWS FOR NATION

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The question of national prohibition again loomed up on the congressional horizon today. That the house will be forced to vote at an early date on a resolution providing for national prohibition through an amendment to the federal constitution was practically assured. This was generally conceded as a result of the expressed willingness of Majority Leader Underwood to have the question brought before the house for a test.

Definite action on the subject was expected to be taken by the house rules committee at a special meeting today. The committee had before it two propositions. One was a revised resolution introduced by Representative Hobson of Alabama, designed to meet opposition to his previous resolution on the ground that it violates states' rights. The other was offered by Representative Cantrell of Kentucky, proposing a special rule for consideration of the original Hobson resolution with a limit of ten hours debate.

## FLORAL PARADE CARNIVAL FEATURE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 10.—Band concerts in different parts of the city, the awarding of prizes for district rose displays and numerous other events early today attracted the crowds to the centers of Portland's eighth annual rose festival.

Chief interest, however, was centered on the floral parade of decorated horse-drawn and motor-driven vehicles, in which there was a record number of entries. Many elaborate and unique floats, formed of thousands of roses, created sharp rivalry for prizes.

A feature of tonight's program was a fire-fighting spectacle in which the city fire department went to rescue motor tenants from a seven-story building brightly illuminated with red fire.

## LEFT MANY DEEDS BUT WILL MISSING

HOUSTON, Tex., June 10.—Deeds to real estate worth hundreds of thousands of dollars, but not a line indicating that he disposed of his large holdings by will or that he had any relatives to inherit his fortune, have been found by the temporary administrators of the estate of F. A. Ogden, who died suddenly several days ago. Several of the deeds have never been recorded and were found in trunks or between leaves of books.

Property in more than 12 states were represented by these papers, including Washington, South Dakota and Oregon.
