REVOLUTION MAY FOLLOW STRIKE

ROME, June 12.—Movements of a revolutionary character were reported today through the provinces of Bologna, Ferrara, Ravenna and Forli, forming what is known as the Romagna.

Although a cessation of the general strike which began on Monday has been ordered by the labor organizations the workmen of extreme views in these districts have refused to return to work. The only communication from Ravenna reports the death of the chief of police as a result of wounds received in the course of a demonstration on Wednesday.

GARLAND TAKEN TO CALIFORNIA FOR TRIAL

Professor W. E. Garland, who has been held in the city jail since last Saturday for alleged embezzling of Fresno (Cal.) women, will be taken back to California this afternoon by Detective Joseph Enos, who arrived this morning from Salem, where he secured requisition papers from Governor West. Mrs. Garland will not return to California. Garland is highly elated to think that he is going to be released from the city jail. According to Detective Enos, Garland talked scores of women out of money, it being alleged that he secured \$7000 from one. He made extravagant promises of returns for their loans through clairvoyancy.

A partner of Garland is being sought by the authorities as sharer in the alleged profits.

DUELLIST DAUDET WOUNDED BY ROUJON

PARIS, June 12.—Leon Daudet, a notorious duellist, was wounded in the forearm in a sword duel today at Neuilly by Jacques Roujon, son of Henry Roujon, the late secretary of the academy of fine arts.

Roujon was the challenger and fought in defense of the name of his father, whose memory he considered to have been injured by articles which appeared in Daudet's paper, the Action Franchiste, a royalist organ.

The encounter took place in private. Only the principals and seconds were present.

smaller banks will, I believe, resume business in a short time."

The La Salle Trust & Savings bank was not a member of the Chicago Clearing-House association.

Deposits Four Millions

According to the cashier, Charles C. Fox, the bank deposits had been over \$3,900,000.

Mr. Harkin said he did not believe the disclosures in the Coyne-Brady scandal had any bearing on the financial condition of the bank. The city of Chicago had \$650,000 on deposit. City Treasurer Flynn attempted to withdraw the funds following the rumor that the bank was in trouble. He was refused by the cashier, who told him no funds could be paid out while the bank was in charge of the bank examiner.

Board of Trade markets were made to reflect to some extent the troubles of the Lorimer banks. A considerable part of a decline of 1 cent from top figures of the day in the price of wheat and of 3/4 in corn was generally attributed to speculative and other selling more or less the outgrowth of the bank difficulties.

CANTON HELD TO GRAND JURY UPON IMMORAL CHARGE

Attorney W. J. Canton was bound over by Justice of the Peace Dux at Jacksonville this morning to the grand jury, under \$1000 bonds, upon a charge of criminal depravity.

The defense, conducted by Attorney Gus Newbury was based upon the alibi, that Mr. Canton was eating lunch in Jacksonville a half mile away at the time of the alleged crime, and that upon the day in question, he wore a light suit and Panama hat, instead of a black hat and dark suit. A general denial of the charge was made by Major Canton.

The state introduced but two witnesses, Isaac Coffman, the alleged victim, who alleged he received 12 cents from Major Canton, and told of the crime, and John Opp who testified that he was a witness to the crime. In contradiction of this, the defense declared that Coffman was showing Major Canton to the Rinehart mine, and that he was left at the point where the trail joins the railroad track.

Prosecutor Kelly declares based on the assertion of the defendant that the case is the result of a political plot, or of personal enmity and says that he was exceedingly loth to bring the charge, spent a day in its verification, and was simply fulfilling the duties of his office, regardless of personalities.

Mr. Canton gave the Mail Tribune the following statement, requesting its publication:

In the issue of the Mail Tribune of yesterday, you saw fit to comment on the charge against me filed by Mr. Kelly and I presume at his instigation, as it his usual custom to try his cases in the newspapers, and to say he was a comrade in the Philippine war, and that I rose from the ranks to major in a crack regiment, and a whole lot of slush, all of which is false except that Mr. Kelly, I understood served in the signal corps in the islands.

From the evidence taken in the hearing of this case today, it seemed absolutely certain that a grave mistake had been made in reference to me, and that the matter charged and being pushed was done for the purpose of destroying me and my business in this city. It was conclusively shown that I was eating my lunch in Jacksonville at the time that the state's main witness charges I was committing a crime about a half mile from there.

Among the first was Mr. Gus Newbury who conducted the hearing and will respectfully refer you to him for a confirmation of this statement.

A square deal is all I ask and as a reputable newspaper you should concede this.

If Mr. Kelly has been misled in this case by other parties, then it may be he is not to blame, but I judge his actions and associations in this matter from his procedure.
