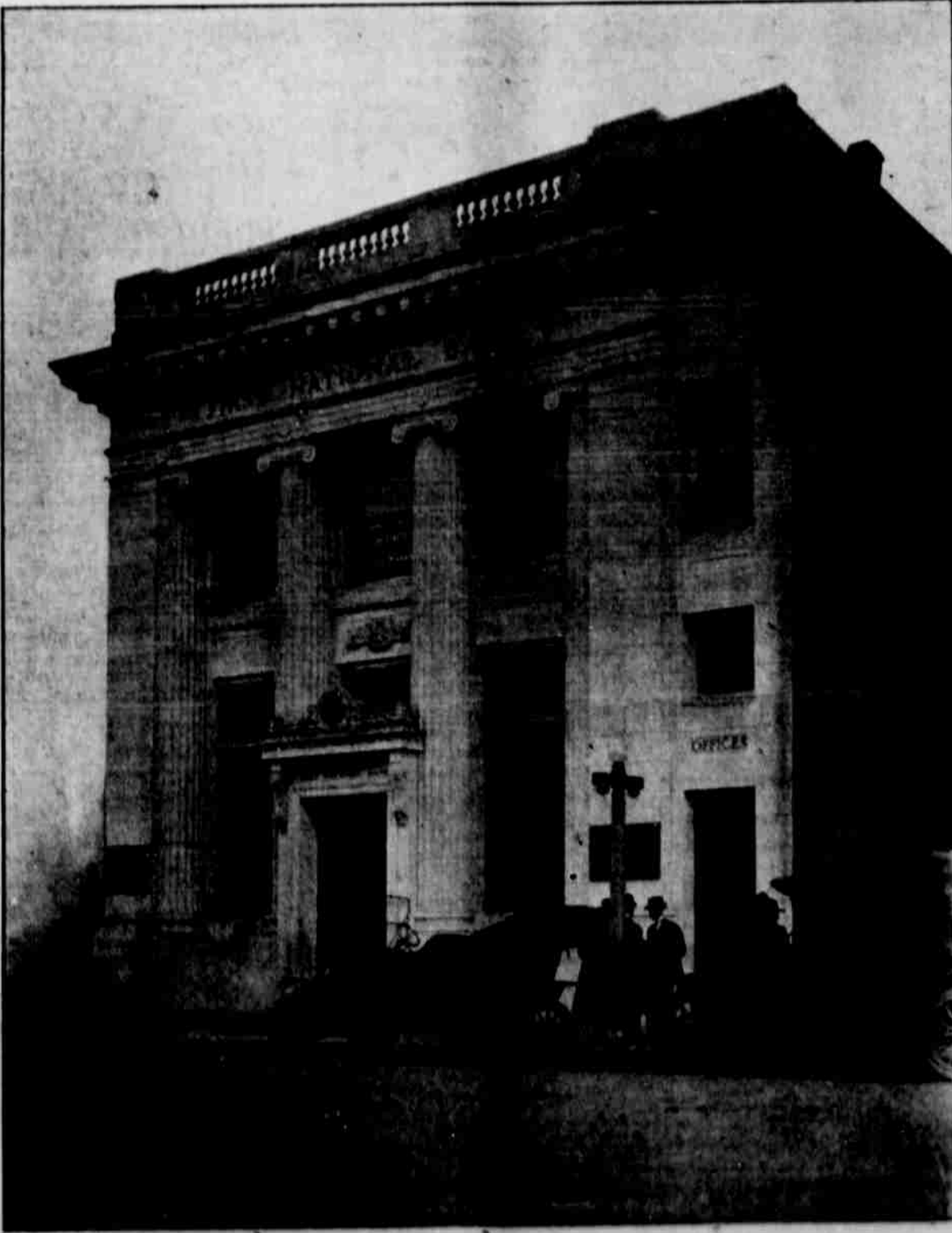

Graham was slaced on a blanket and his friends began a struggle to carry him down the mountain. All night they labored over the rocks with their heavy burden, assisted by relief parties sent out from Redding. Rushing Reported Injured A determined effort was made early today to obtain information concerning W. J. Rashir - United States forest supervisor, who was reported to have been injured while making an observation near the crater. A party that accompanied Forest Ranger Abbey to the summit several days ago had a narrow escape from suffocation. A number of sightseers who started up the mountain yesterday had not been accounted for definitely early today. Overwhelmed by Eruption Graham and two companions, E. E. Phelps and F. A. Tipple, both sawmill men were overwhelmed in the morning eruption, near the crater. Ashes shrouded them in blackness so thick that they could not see to flee or seek shelter. Wrapping themselves in their coats, to keep as much of the sulphur fumes from their lungs, as was possible, they made shift as best they might to endure their terror. When the shower of ashes ceased falling and the air began to clear, Phelps and Tipple could nowhere see Graham. It was some time before they found him, lying down in the blanket of newly fallen ashes, with a deep wound in one side and apparently lifeless. Sent for an Undertaker Graham is a heavy man, the mountain side is rugged climbing, and after dragging the body down hill a quarter of a mile, Tipple and Phelps, believing Graham dead, left him sheltered beside a rock and hurried to Manzanita Lake, four miles farther for aid.

From Manzanita Lake word was telephoned to Redding for the coroner. He and an undertaker were six miles on their way before they could be reached with the news that Graham was alive and that a physician was needed not an undertaker. In the meantime at Manzanita Lake, Tipple and Phelps got help and climbed four miles up the mountain to recover what they supposed was Graham's body. They found him covered with an inch of ashes but when his features had been wiped clean, they saw signs of returning animation. It was then 4:00 o'clock in the afternoon, about six hours after the first eruption. Somehow or other, the five lifted, pulled, dragged, and in open spots, carried the helpless Graham four miles to Manzanita Lake, where they got an automobile for Viola. FAMOUS BUFFALO HUNTER VISITS CITY A. J. Smoot, the pioneer settler of the Butte country unsurvived was a Medford visitor Monday. Mr. Smoot was a buffalo hunter in the days of Buffalo Bill and knew many a hunter whose record exceeded that of the famous scout in number of buffaloes slain. He hunted from 1868 to 1884. The pelts sold for from \$1.50 to \$2.00 each. The animals were skinned with a team, the hide being cut around the head with a knife and the body stripped by use of the team. Mr. Smoot declares that the slaughter of the buffaloes was in the interest of civilization and encouraged by the government, as the ranges used by the buffalo were available for cattle, and when the buffalo went the problem of the Indian was solved.
