VEAL DEMAND CAUSES SLAUGHTER OF DAIRY CALVES

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 22.—The demand for veal has increased rapidly, and not only are the surplus dairy calves slaughtered but thousands of beef calves as well, until a calf will now sell for from \$8 to \$12 when only two to three months old. This quotation from Farmer's Bulletin 588 of the U. S. department of agriculture means that unless the farmer has unlimited cheap feeds, it is usually more profitable to market the dairy or dual-purpose calves than to attempt to raise them, even though some of them might make good steers. While many deplore this heavy slaughter of calves, and legislation against it has been urged, the consumer's demand must be met. While the number of cattle has decreased, the demand for meat has naturally grown until not only have the exports nearly ceased, but the packers that they may provide cheaper meat, are now buying many cattle that were formerly fed. The farmers who formerly bought nearly finished cattle as feeders have been compelled to pay higher prices for such cattle or to take thinner animals. The cattle-feeding business has changed greatly during recent years. Formerly steers from four to six years of age were fed in large numbers on commercial feed at yards near granaries or mills, or upon large farms where only the roughage was grown, and the cattle were kept on full feed for six months or longer. This method because too expensive, so feeding is now conducted upon farms as a means of marketing farm products by converting them into beef, while the manure produced is utilized as a by-product for maintaining fertility.

LIVESTOCK MARKET KEEPS ITS STRENGTH

PORTLAND, June 22.—Receipts for the week have been cattle, 1511; calves, 71; hogs, 2432; sheep, 8004. Cattle prices steady to firm all week. Receipts of fair volume, especially first half of period. Good grass steers sold \$7.25 to \$7.50. Light hay stuff \$7.75. Butcher trade slow, due to inferior stuff offering. The hog market maintained its strength throughout the week, with buying demand keen and outlet strong. Extreme top at week's close \$8.10, with bulk going around \$6 and \$8.05. Sheep house a very snappy department, with a steady call for smooth, fat mutton and lambs. Fancy yearlings at \$4.75 and \$5.00 featured. Even ranged from \$4.00 to \$4.25. Lamb buying was on a \$6.00 basis and the trade could have used more than was offered.

Mr. Finley said the president instantly approved of the plan.

STOCKS SOAR UPON DECISION FAVORING RAILROAD GRANTS

NEW YORK, June 22.—Sluggish and narrow movements characterized speculation in stocks today until the supreme court decision in the Southern Pacific oil case galvanized the market into activity and strength. The close was at the best. Southern Pacific extended its recovery to over three points on largely expanded dealings. Other stocks rose to a fractional net. Speculation was active in Rock Island securities at the opening of the stock market today, but otherwise trading was featureless. Rock Island debentures were slightly higher, but the other bonds, which advanced Saturday after announcement of the re-organization plan, worked lower. The collaterals dropped back 1% to 2%. The bonds, as well as the common stock, at 1%, and the preferred at 3%, made new low records. The general market was steady, with an improving tendency among the standard shares. By rising 5/8 to 59, Utah Copper reached the highest of the year. A sudden spurt of over a point in Southern Pacific followed the decision of the United States supreme court in favor of the Southern Pacific road regarding some of the latter company's oil well holdings in California.

HAVEMEYER'S DAUGHTER TO WED EARL OF EASTON

NEW YORK, June 22.—Advices from London announce the engagement of Miss Edythe Havemeyer, daughter of the late Henry Havemeyer of New York, and the Earl of Easton. The earl, who was born in 1859, is the heir of the Duke of Grafton, who is 93 years of age. Miss Edythe Havemeyer has made her home for some years in England. At the age of 22, she caused something of a social stir by her announcing her independence and breaking away from family ties. She has been living with her married sister in Dunbartonshire, Scotland. She went to London and fitted up her own home, where she has since been living with a chaperone.
