STATE AUDITOR HALTS BANK PROBE

CHICAGO, June 23.—Plans of State's Attorney Marley Hoynes for the investigation of the suspension of the La Salle Street Trust and Savings Bank and others of the Lorimer-Munday string of state banks, were brought to a halt, at least temporary, today by the refusal of James J. Brady, state auditor, to turn over to Hoynes a copy of the report of Bank Examiner Daniel V. Harkin. Hoynes said that the reports was a public record and that he could enforce its production. Three large deposits, claimed as privileged, were planned to be formally demanded today from the receiver of the La Salle Street Bank. There were Marquette National Fire Insurance Company \$274,000 in securities; Fred A. Busse, former mayor of Chicago \$136,700 as trustee for the Kellogg-Mackey company, and J. J. Brady, state auditor \$16,000, state funds.

CALLED FROM ALASKA TO SEE DYING WIFE

WASHINGTON, June 23.—His wife hovering between life and death, thousands of miles away from him, Captain P. Ubbroth, of the Revenue Cutter McCulloch, now at Unalaska, Alaska, was expected today to start on a two weeks race for her bedside in Philadelphia. Every means at the command of the revenue cutter service here have been employed in an effort to get word to Captain Ubbroth of his wife's illness but they were without avail until Saturday, when the cutter McCulloch arrived at Unalaska. Wireless dispatches were sent but they failed to reach Captain Ubbroth's ship. Captain Ubbroth was expected to leave Unalaska today on the steamer Dora for Cordova. Three days will be occupied in making this first jump. He will then transfer at Cordova to a steamer bound for Seattle, a five days trip. At Seattle Captain Ubbroth will board the first train east and probably will reach Philadelphia five or six days later, making about 14 days before he can reach his wife's bedside.

RED BLUFF BOYS SELL FAKE LASSEN ROCK

RED BLUFF, June 23.—A number of Red Bluff boys are taking advantage of the activities on Mt. Lassen. A number of them have been peddling small rocks they gathered from the roadbed of the Southern Pacific and selling these as souvenirs of the eruption. The rocks are labeled lava, and tourists passing through on trains take them eagerly at ten cents each. Yesterday one woman bought three pieces of roadbed and wanted a dozen. The little shaver who was selling the "souvenirs" told her if she would wait, until he found his partner who had just received fresh samples from the crater, she would be accommodated. He went out on the rear of the train, picked up a dozen small stones, and received \$1.50 for them.

STING IS GONE.

NEW YORK, June 23.—Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the Southern Pacific company, said today of the supreme court decision in the oil lands case: "In the opinion of our counsel it sets forth principles which should to a very large extent do away with the numerous other suits which are now pending in the courts regarding other oil properties in California. It takes the sting out of the government suit against the Southern Pacific, leaving but one contention against the company, namely, fraud in obtaining title to the lands, and the government will have to prove such contention."

CARRANZA'S ACT NOT CONSIDERED

EAGLE PASS, Tex., June 23.—General Villa is determined to complete the absolute defeat of Huerta and fight his way at the head of his army into Mexico City, irrespective of the action General Carranza may take according to reports brought to the border today by travelers arriving from Torreon and Monterey. These reports state that after Villa occupies Zacatecas he will push on south without waiting for troop movements other than those under his own direction.
