HOLDING INQUEST OVER VICTIM OF

BUTTE, Mont., June 27.- The inquest over Ernest J. Noy, who was shot down in front of the miners union half Tuesday night in the riot between the factions of metal miners began today. More than fifteen wilnesses have been subpoenned.

Before the inquest began, Sheriff Tim Driscoll ordered every man in the coroner's office to leave the room. Then the sheriff stationed two deputies at the door and searched every man who entered for arms. None were found.

Joseph McCaffery county attorney, today reiterated that he expected to file a charge of murder after the inquest. Mr. McCaffery asserted the testimony at the inquest would prove that the bullet that killed Nov was fired from the street.

The new independent union of the miners was represented at the inquest by "Muckie" McDonald, president and J. E. Bradley, vice-president and other officers. McDonald submitted smilingly to being searched for weapons.
