

HORSE RESCUED FROM DEEP WELL IT HAD FALLEN IN

Much commotion was caused in the northwest portion of the city Wednesday during when a horse belonging to Bill Welch broke through a board covering over an old well on adjacent property and tumbled down and many gathered, each with a plan of his or her own for the animal's rescue, an in an hour or two was spent in discussing ways and means. Meanwhile, G. G. Dow kept the telephones wires hot trying to locate block and tackle. Finally Fort Hubbard volunteered and brought the required outfit.

A derrick was improvised and then arose the problem of getting the rope around the horse. First the animal's foot was snared, but the rope slipped off. Then Bill volunteered to go down and put the rope around the horse. He staid down so long that the block and tackle outfit was used to lift him out of the foul air at the well bottom, which overcame him.

After four hours of hard work the rescue was accomplished and midnight saw the animal safe on solid earth.

PORTLAND BUSINESS MEN WANT STATE WET

PORTLAND, July 3.—The straw ballot on prohibition taken by the Portland Chamber of Commerce which was canvassed yesterday afternoon by the board of trustees showed the members of that body to favor the saloon by a vote of 479 to 111. Four of the ballots were blank. Of the 560 members, only 555 voted.

The vote is given out not as an expression of the Chamber as a body, but as the opinion of the individual members. The vote was not taken at the request of the Hopgrowers' association, but was suggested by members within the organization. The members of the Chamber who are most interested in the matter are hotelkeepers and brewers.

Several other cities have taken similar votes. These include San Francisco, Los Angeles and St. Paul. In several cases resolutions on the subject have been officially passed.

Considerable opposition to the vote was expressed before the count was made public, and it was thought for a time the result would be kept secret.

PREDICTS INCREASE IN CITY'S SUPPLY

A half million gallons increase in water from the city water supply is expected by Councilmen Medynski, when he finishes improvements contemplated as a result of an inspection of intake and system this week. By raising the overflow valves he says the increased flow will be obtained.

Councilman Medynski inspected the pipe line, and found it in much better shape than he expected. The 600 foot tunnel was also inspected, and cave-ins found where the supporting timbers had rotted. A force of men will be sent up next week to make needed repairs, and the water system put in first class shape at a cost of several hundred dollars.

RESTITUTION OFFER SQUARES CONSCIENCE AFTER 44 YEARS

This is the story of W. H. Judson of Portland, Oregon, whose conscience hurt him after 44 years, and secured easement therefore from County Judge F. L. Ton Valle.

In 1870, Judson lived in Ashland. A sick man was in the Ashland Hotel and he was given the task of nursing him. The sick man died. Judson took from his purse his wages, at \$2.50 per day, and what was left he turned over to the county court, but there was not enough to pay the undertaker, the doctor and the druggist.

At a campmeeting of the Apostolic Faith in the Rose City last week Judson became converted and his memory recalled the selfish act of nearly half a century before, when he received full tithes, but others did not. He forthwith began to take steps to right himself with the world and the future, and wrote the county court a letter, asking Jackson county to forgive him. Forgiveness was extended to him by County Judge Ton Valle.

Judson's letter is as follows: Portland, Ore., June 28, 1914. "To the Honorable Judge of Jackson county,

Dear Sir:

In about the year 1870 or 71 I was living in Ashland. There was a sick man brought there to the Ashland Hotel, and I was given the job of nurse to him. In three or four weeks he died, so I took of his money just what would pay me at \$2.50 per day for taking care of him, and it took most of the money that he had. There was a little change left that was turned into the county, and the doctor and the hotelkeeper turned in their bill. Now God has saved me of my sins and the word teaches me that I will have to make restitution for all of my back life before I can have a pure heart and that is what the word of God teaches and I know that I did not do right. I taking my wages out of his money, but should have turned it all into the county, and shared with the others. So inclosed I send what we believe, and a stamped envelope with my address asking that the county will forgive me for taking the law into my own hands instead of letting the county do it."
