

### TRI-COUNTY LEAGUE ELECTS OFFICERS AT KLAMATH MEETING

An organization that bids fair to play an important part in the development of southern Oregon was perfected at the meeting held at the chamber of commerce rooms yesterday morning. Ben C. Sheldon was responsible for the movement which had its first impetus at a meeting held in Medford last April, says the Klamath Northwestern.

Representatives of the commercial clubs of Klamath Falls, Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford were in attendance yesterday and several other clubs have already applied for membership. Will Steel was selected president; E. B. Hall vice president; W. E. Newcombe of Ashland, secretary, and George Hobart of Grants Pass, treasurer.

The purpose of the league is to unite the three counties of Klamath, Jackson and Josephine in the promotion, advertisement and improvement of their natural attractions. It is well known that such features as Crater Lake, Marble Halls of Oregon, Ashland's mineral springs and the numerous other beauty spots of the three counties, taken singly, will not attract the host of tourists and home-seekers that will come on a proper presentation of all these attractions as a unit. This league, just organized, proposes to do a carefully prepared auto road may be published for wide distribution; pamphlets on the climatic advantages, fishing and hunting opportunities will be prepared. Moving picture men and magazine writers will be brought into the district and be given an opportunity to see what is to be seen. The league will also lend its influence to the cause of public parks and good roads.

Strong resolutions favoring the reopening of the Ashland Normal School were adopted. President G. J. Walton of the local Chamber of Commerce presided at the meeting. The next meeting will be held at the call of the president of the new organization.

### WOMEN WOUNDED BY TARRYTOWN BOMB

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., July 6.—The women wounded in New York by a bomb explosion Saturday are to be arranged in connection with the demonstrations against the Rockefeller, father and son.

Special guards surrounded the courtroom and extra guards patrolled the always closely watched Rockefeller estate near here. There was talk for a time of postponing today's hearing because of the excitement caused by the bomb tragedy. But the town officials after a conference with the New York police, decided to proceed with the police. A large party of the prisoners' sympathizers was expected.

### MARTIN L. CLARDY DEAD AT ST. LOUIS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 6.—An accidental fall against a radiator caused the death of Martin L. Clardy, for 20 years a member of congress, vice-president and general solicitor for the Missouri Pacific railroad and at one time a leading factor in democratic politics of Missouri. Mr. Clardy, though 77 years old, was in comparatively good health, having attended to office duties last Friday.

Last night Mr. Clardy felt indisposed. After laying abed for a while he arose and walked into the hall of his home. He fell and his head struck a radiator and he died before the physician arrived.

### TRAIN ROBBERS CAUGHT; CONFESS PART IN CRIME

PENDLETON, Ore., July 6.—With Albert Meadows and Clarence Stoner, the two surviving bandits of the three that held up Oregon-Washington railroad and Navigation train No. 5 last Thursday, in jail here, county officers and railroad detectives today turned their attention to locating the persons who were robbed and to returning their money and jewelry.

The two robbers were arrested late Saturday and, after confessing yesterday, took officers to where they had cached their loot.

The loot consisted of nearly \$400 in money, a quantity of rings and watches and some checks and money orders that were taken from the express car safe.

The wife of the leader of the gang, Charles Manning, who was killed in a gun fight on the train by Deputy Sheriff George McDuffey, was expected to arrive here tomorrow from Cokeville, Wyo., to claim her husband's body. Besides his wife, Manning is survived by four children.

Stoner and Meadows declared that they had never committed any crime before and had been lead into participation in the robbery by Manning. They were arrested about twenty miles from the scene of the hold-up after dodging posses for three days.

### CARPENTER CABLES OFFER TO FIGHT CLABBY

SYDNEY, N. S. W., July 6.—Georges Carpentier, middleweight champion of France, was cabled today an offer of \$20,000 to meet Jimmy Clabby, of Hammonds, Ind., claimant of the middleweight championship of the world. The offer was made by promoters of the Stadium here.

Clabby's latest victory was July 4 when he won from Eddie McGoorty, of Oshkosh, Wis., on a foul in the eighth of a scheduled 20 round fight.

### RETAIL MEAT MARKET EXEMPT UNDER LIABILITY LAW

SALEM, Or., July 6.—Retail meat, poultry, fish markets and grocery stores do not come under the Workmen's Compensation Act, according to an announcement of the State Industrial Accident Commission today. The commission said the business were not of a hazardous nature.

### KANSAS CITY LINE TO MEXICO SOLD TO BONDHOLDERS

WICHITA, Kans., July 6.—The Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway was sold here today for \$6,001,000 to the re-organization committee representing the bondholders of the company. The bid was made by A. M. Wickwire of New York City. There were no other bids.

Application for the receivership of the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway, which the federal court ordered to be sold here today to a re-organization committee of New York and London capitalists, was made before Judge John C. Pollock in the federal court in Kansas City, Kans., March 7, 1912.

Eleven receivers were appointed to take over the company's affairs in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Immediately afterward the holders of the company's stocks and bonds began work on plans for the re-financing and re-organization of the road and fifteen million dollars of European capital was raised for the purpose of finishing the road and putting it into operation from Kansas City to the Pacific coast of Mexico.

April 7, last, Judge Pollock, having been informed the re-organization committee had completed its plan for the rehabilitation of the Orient, ordered its sale for an amount not under \$6,000,000.

Following the sale, it is announced the new company, headed by Edward Dickinson as president, will assume full management and the work of extending the road from Wichita to Kansas City will be begun.

### CHAMBERLAIN'S FUNERAL HELD AT BIRMINGHAM

BIRMINGHAM, England, July 6.—The body of Joseph Chamberlain, the Unionist leader who for many years occupied a prominent position in British politics was buried today in Hookley cemetery in the constituency he longed represented in the house of commons.

A memorial service was attended by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham, the members of the city council and other civic dignitaries.

Apart from the civic element the mourners at both the church and the cemetery ceremony consisted solely of the Chamberlain family as the statesman had requested that his funeral should be free from any public nature. Nothing, however, could prevent a great crowd of the citizens of Birmingham, among whose Joseph Chamberlain was popular hero, from lining the route along which the funeral passed from.

### ALBANIAN MOSLEMS CAPTURE KORITZA

DURAZZO, Albania, July 6.—It was reported here today that the Musulman insurgents in Southern Albania, who are fighting against the government of Prince William, had captured the important town of Koritza.
