PARIS, Ark., July 15.—Maintaining his innocence, Arthur Tillman, 22 years old, was hanged in the jail yard here today for the murder of his sweetheart, Amanda Stephens, 19 years old, whose body was found buried in an abandoned well at Delaware, Ark., last March.

CENTRAL OREGON GRAIN DAMAGED BY HAIL

MORO, Or., July 15.—Property and crop damage, variously estimated at from \$100,000 to \$250,000, was done in Sherman county, on the east side of the Deschutes valley, Sunday night when three distinct storms, either as cloudbursts or of heavy hail, left a path of devastation through thousands of acres of growing grain.

His four-year-old Harmonleone won the principal event, the July handicap of \$2500, over a distance of six furlongs, and his two-year-old Sanducky carried off the two-year-old selling plate of \$750 over a distance of five furlongs.
