MILITANT SLASHES CARLISLE'S PORTRAIT

LONDON, July 17.—A militant suffragette today slashed with a butcher's cleaver the portrait of Thomas Carlyle, the Scottish historian, painted by Sir John Millais and hanging in the national portrait gallery. The woman was arrested after a severe struggle with the attendants. At the police station she gave her name as Anne Hunt. The attendants had the greatest difficulty in preventing Miss Hunt from doing further damage. She struggled desperately, but eventually was handed over to the police. She was bleeding profusely from cuts on her hands, caused by the breaking of glass.

MOHENA PREDICTS MORE REVOLUTIONS

HAVANA, July 17.—The former Mexican minister of commerce, Querido Mohena, prior to his departure yesterday for New York, said Huerta's resignation was no surprise to him, and expressed the belief that a constitutional government would be short-lived. "Within 30 days," he added, "the people who are now shouting approval will cry death to the revolution. In six months Huerta will be the most popular man in Mexico, because the Latin race always pitied the fallen and oppressed the powerful." The American customs inspectors refused to allow Senora Mohena to take board the steamer Miami with her hats trimmed with agrettes, because such plumage is forbidden entrance into the United States. She sent them back with a friend to Mexico, and Senor Mohena, learning of the prohibition, exclaimed: "This could only be expected from an American."

ning parallel or tandem will be run over the bridge to test it. Should the successful bidder to whom the contract is awarded fail to execute the same within ten days from the date of notification of such award, such cash, bond or check shall be forfeited to Jackson county and the same shall be the property of said county.
A corporate surety bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in a sum equal to one-half of the total amount of the sum bid. The county court reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to accept the proposal deemed best for Jackson county.
