AUSTRIA AND SERBIA TO WAR (Continued from page 1.)

Peter Abducted

LONDON, July 25.—Serbia has accepted Austria-Hungary's ultimatum, according to a special cablegram received here this evening from Belgrade by way of Vienna.

BELGRADE, July 25.—Serbia, according to sources usually in close touch with the foreign office in Belgrade, has requested Austria for an extension of time in which to reply to the note asking for a delay until the Serbian parliament, which has been summoned to an extraordinary session, shall have been consulted.

Russian Request Refused

VIENNA, July 25.—An extension of time of forty-eight hours in which Serbia may reply to Austria's note was requested today by the Russian charge d'affaires.

LONDON, July 25.—A special dispatch from Vienna says the Russian charge d'affaires, who requested the Austro-Hungarian foreign office for a prolongation of the time limit for the Serbian reply to the Austrian note was informed that it could not be granted.

Robbers Murder

NEW ORLEANS, July 25.—Only five dollars was secured last night by two masked bandits who shot and killed Tom Elgin, a flagman in an attempt to hold up the New York limited passenger train of the Louisville and Nashville railway at Genoa, a small station three miles east of here.

According to Conductor E. C. Potter, the bandits boarded the train at New Orleans. Shortly after passing Genoa they pulled the bell cord. The train slowed down and the conductor began an investigation.

One of the robbers covered him with a revolver and then rifled his pockets. The porter approached while the bandits were at work. One of them shot at him, the bullet striking the flagman who was just behind the porter. The highwaymen then jumped from the train.

A special train with officers and physicians was rushed to the scene.
