WASHINGTON, July 30.—Edwin A. Potter, a Chicago business man and banker, was being considered today by President Wilson for the place on the federal reserve board made vacant by the withdrawal of the nomination of Thomas D. Jones. It was said definitely, however, that the president had not finally decided, but that Mr. Potter, W. T. Fenton and Charles G. Dawes were under consideration.

RUSSIA GIVEN DAY TO EXPLAIN

tion had grown worse today instead of better. They pointed out that the mobilization of the Russian army at a time when Austria-Hungary had not moved a man toward the Russian frontier could only be interpreted in one way and that was that Russia was determined to support Serbia.

It was added that France also was known to be making secret military preparations and that although Germany had not yet mobilized it was questionable whether she could remain inactive much longer in face of the military preparations on her borders.

The proceedings at the imperial conference at Potsdam yesterday under the presidency of Emperor William, have been kept a close secret. It is known that no steps have been taken toward the mobilization of the German navy. The battle squadrons are concentrated at Kiel and Wilhelmshaven and are still on a normal footing and none of the reserve ships have been manned, according to the admiralty. Everything, however, is in instant readiness for bringing the navy up to war strength, should the call come.

Federal Council Called

Major General Erich von Falkenhayn, German minister of war and Lieutenant General Count Helmuth von Moltke, chief of the German general staff had a long conference today with Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the imperial chancellor, Prince Henry of Prussia, the emperor's brother and several of the imperial ministers, who assembled at the chancellor's palace.

Rumors were current afterward that the first German army corps with headquarters at Koenigsberg had mobilized and that a call had been issued for a session of the federal council, which is composed of representatives of the states of Germany.

WOULD POSTPONE TRUST LEGISLATION

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Some law making it unprofitable for a corporation to do more than a certain percentage of business of its line is the only effective way of dealing with present trust situation, Senator Sutherland, republican, of Utah, declared today in the course of the trust bill debate. He contended "mere size" was very objectionable when a corporation reached the point of doing most of the business of its line, even if it sold goods at a lower price, because it destroyed individualism on which American institutions rest.

Urging that proposed legislation did not reach the evil, Senator Sutherland asked that the trade commission bill be referred for consideration until next winter.

CHANGE IN WIND SAVES SISSON

SISSON, Cal., July 30.—For the present Sisson is out of danger from the forest fires that hem it in. A shift in the wind to the southward has carried the flames toward Upton, where today large box factories are endangered.

Thus far 6000 acres of timber have been burned. The fire is moving slowly but so stubbornly that it has proved almost impossible to check and the heat that can be hoped to confine it within narrow bounds.

PLAN AMALGAMATION OF MINERS' UNIONS

DENVER, Colo., July 30.—The proposal to amalgamate the Western Federation of Miners and the United Mineworkers of America was ordered to reach a vote in the convention of the metal miners' organization today. The question was a special order of business at today's session, which was addressed by Frank J. Hayes, international vice-president of the United Mineworkers of America.

BERLIN, July 30.—Settlement dealings on the Bourse were entirely suspended today and the brokers who gathered on the floor confined themselves to cash transactions.

COTTON DECLINES DUE TO WAR NEWS

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 30.—As the result of pessimistic cablegrams today from large market centers of Europe and vague rumors to the effect that big English concerns were curbing the American side not to risk further shipments of various commodities, cotton declined \$2.50 a bale during the late forenoon.

i n acute controversies in regard to the domestic differences, whose importance to ourselves none is disposed to belittle.

"I need not say more than that such a use of our time at such a moment may have an injurious and lasting injurious effect on the international situation.

Postpones Home Rule

"Mr. Bonar Law, leader of the opposition, shares to the full the views I have expressed. We therefore propose to postpone for the present the second reading of the amending bill without prejudice to its future, in the hope that by the postponement of this discussion the patriotism of all parties will contribute to what lies in our power to avert, to at least circumscribe—the calamity which threatens the whole world."

Mr. Asquith's reference to all parties rallying to the support of the government were heartily cheered by all the members.

The British foreign office, whose suggestion of a conference of the ambassadors in London of the great powers failed to meet with the approval of Germany and Austria, has now invited Germany to suggest some diplomatic way out of the difficulty which will meet the approval of Austria-Hungary, and a reply is expected at any moment.
