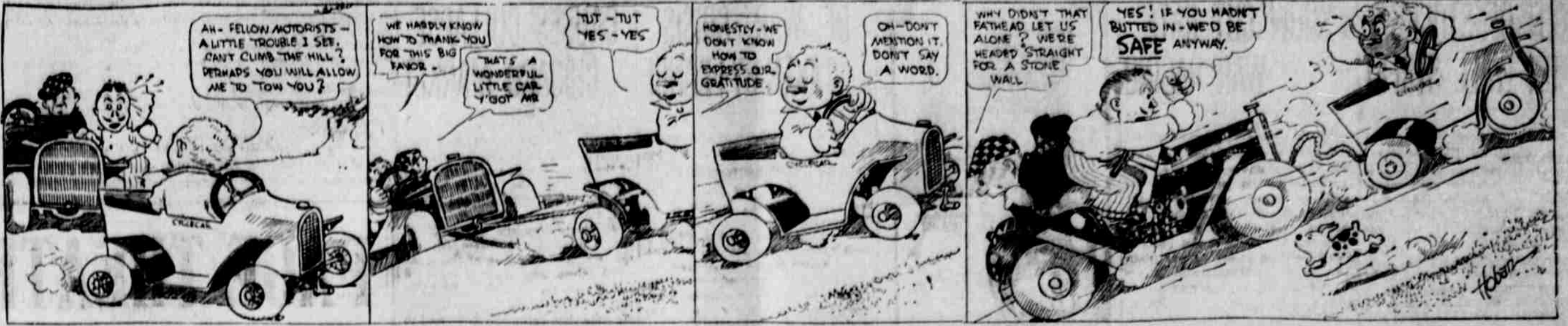

INTEREST IN \$10,000 RACE IS FEVERISH

DETROIT, Mich., July 30.—With the final result of the \$10,000 M. and M. stake, for 2:14 trotters, undecided, interest in the great classic still was at fever heat today. Three heat winners remained after yesterday's stirring six-heat struggle, to fight this afternoon for the prize. They were: Peter Scott, driven by Walter Cox, with two heats to his credit; Lassie McGregor, also with two firsts, piloted by Tommy Murphy, and Linda Vrona, McDevitt up, with one win. Rhythm, driven out to win the first heat yesterday, was distanced in the second mile and so gets no part of the stake. The regular program for the day comprised the free-for-all pace, \$5000, in which the greatest pacers in training were named to start; the 2:09 trot, \$2500; the 2:18 pace, \$1050, and 2:16 trot, \$1050.

CLEARING MEXICO OF GUERRILLA TROOPS

AGUAS CALIENTES, Mex., July 30.—Colonel Alberto Fuentes, recently installed as constitutionalist governor of Aguas Calientes state, today ordered troops to proceed south to clear the country of some federal irregulars who have been molesting various places. It is presumed the marauders are part of the forces of Generals Pascual Orozco, Marcello Carraveo, two former rebels, and of Garcia Hidalgo, former federal governor of the state. Their main forces are at Celaya. Fuentes was elected governor three years ago.

CUOT OUT SOFT PAY FOR NAVY PETS DANIELS' HOPE

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Secretary Daniels in a statement today emphasized the importance of action at this session of congress on legislation to curtail the increasing expenditures due to retired pay for young naval and marine corps officers. Mr. Daniels said he had found that frequently officers with comparatively little service were retired for physical disability of organic nature and that a great majority of these are still able to take up many pursuits in civil life without loss of time. A bill prepared by the secretary and now pending would provide that any officer who had had less than ten years service would receive one-fourth pay on retirement and those with more than ten years and less than twenty years service, half pay unless they have been totally incapacitated by disease or disability incident to the service.

FIVE HUNDRED FIGHTERS BATTING SIBSON FOREST FIRE

SIBSON, Cal., July 30.—With a great forest fire steadily drawing nearer to the northern limits of this town, business completely suspended and virtually every able-bodied resident aiding in resisting the flames advance, Sibson seems tonight on the verge of destruction. The fact that the town is not a mass of ruins is due solely to the heroic work of five hundred fire fighters, headed by Forest Supervisor Hammett, shortly after noon, when a sudden veering of the wind to the north fanned the flames over all trenches, backfires and other barriers effected during the three days attack.

CONVICT MINARD AND LOGAN OF LAND FRAUDS

PORTLAND, July 30.—The twelve jurors voted solid on the first ballot for the conviction of Logan and Minard and stood seven for acquittal and five for conviction of Sellers. It was on the second ballot that the jury decided to return a verdict of not guilty for Sellers, said the members of the jury. The defendants were granted thirty days in which to file motion for a new trial to arrest judgment. On motion of United States District Attorney Reames the bond of Minard was raised from \$2000 to \$5000. Logan, the other convicted defendant is in jail, not having been able to furnish bail. The penalty for the offense of which the defendants were charged is a fine of not more than \$10,000, two years imprisonment or both. When the verdict was rendered one of the longest and hardest fought trials of recent Portland history came to a close. So stubbornly was each point contested by the respective attorneys for the defense and the prosecution by the introduction of numerous witnesses that the trial endured three weeks, having opened July 9.

MARINES SAIL TO RESTORE PEACE IN HAITI

NORFOLK, Va., July 30.—The transport Hancock sailed early today for Guantanamo, Cuba, with 400 marines to add to the force mobilized there for possible developments in Haiti. We can no more afford to see France crushed by Germany or the balance of power upset against France, than Germany can afford to see Austria-Hungary crushed by Russia. Upon that issue, should it have to be determined by arms, our friends and our enemies will find that we think and act with one accord."
