KAISER MAKES BID FOR BRITISH PEACE

LONDON, Aug. 5.—A white book on the recent correspondence which preceded the opening of hostilities between England and Germany, issued today, contains a letter from the British ambassador at Berlin, Sir William Edward Goschen, saying that Germany had made a "strong bid for British neutrality," offering if Great Britain remained neutral to give assurances that Germany did not aim at territorial acquisition at the expense of France.

Asked if the same attitude applied to the French colonies, the German chancellor, Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, said that he was unable to give a similar understanding regarding the colonies.

The British foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, replied to the ambassador's communication: "It would be a disgrace for us to make this bargain with Germany at the expense of France—a disgrace from which the good name of this country would never recover."

GERMANS INSULT RUSSIAN CONVOYS

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 6, via London.—The Russian ambassador in Berlin, M. De Vverhev, and his staff, are reported to have been subjected to much abuse after the declaration of war. Some of the members of the ambassadorial suite, including Princess Belosselsky, who was Miss Sasia Whittier of Boston, and First Secretary of Embassy Charovitski, are alleged actually to have been struck by persons in the crowd which followed their motor cars to the railroad station when they were leaving Berlin.

According to an eye witness, the embassy was surrounded, and when the ambassador, who was escorted by mounted police, departed, for the station in an automobile, the people hurled storms of abuse at him. The police had the greatest difficulty in protecting him and the members of the staff. Friends of the ambassador, who followed him in motor cars also said to have been forced to run a gauntlet of hostile Germans. The crowd followed the cars, abusing the occupants of them, throwing stones, spitting in the faces of the embassy staff and striking both men and women with sticks and umbrellas, it is said.
