UNCLE SAM BUYS SILVER BULLION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The treasury department today gave orders to the San Francisco mint to buy two hundred thousand ounces of silver at 51 1/2 cents an ounce. Officials hoped this action may relieve to some extent the silver market which has been affected by the European war.
