The Ruling Few an Obstruction to World Peace

(By Gen. H. Shibley, director bureau of Political Research, Washington.) Especially do I wish to direct attention to the fact that the insurmountable obstacle that has been and is standing in the way of the greatly desired world peace is the oligarchy of Germany combined with the Austro-Hungarian oligarchy. They are standing square across the pathway of progress. Here are the unquestioned facts:

The combined oligarchies, the remnant of the ruling few that stood forth in the holy alliance for the overthrow of representative government throughout the world, are beating back the people's demand for self-government.

As far back as 1876 Bismarck joined hands with the conservatives in Germany, and since then the German government has bitterly fought the oncoming tide of the people's power.

It is now two generations since the apportionment of the vote for the lower house of the German parliament was made, and vast changes have come about in the distribution of population, still no reapportionment has been made. Berlin and the other cities are with comparatively little representation in the lower house, with none in the upper house, and one man alone appoints the chancellor, yet the injustice and wrong continues. Year by year the oligarchy has been almost overwhelmed, but by specious pleas about the danger to the German people from the adjoining folk they have stayed in office and controlled the government.

In doing so they have steadily increased the army and navy. This has compelled the adjoining states to do likewise or be overpowered by the bulwark—a set of hard-pressed leaders, brilliant of intellect and largely bereft of moral sense. Lives of falsehoods have been their lot, ever slandering and vilifying the peoples growing power. At the last general election in Germany this band of selfish special interests, self-created through their control of the government, were actually defeated in the lower house. Yet by means of the peculiar German system whereby the kaiser is really the head of the government until a revolutionary change is effected, the oligarchy has retained control of the army and navy while yielding to the passage of laws whereby the few are paying a special assessment of a billion marks for the immediate increase in fortifications, and for certain increases in the army and navy they are to submit to a tax on the increase of land values.

At precisely the same time that the German oligarchy were doing these things, in Austria-Hungary a similar increase in war weapons was taking place. The people vigorously objected, and in Hungary the law was forced through in an unconstitutional manner. The opposition committed such a protest that the meeting of the parliament was discontinued. Three days later "golent scenes in the lower house were again enacted, and the government leader's life was attempted. For a considerable time he did not venture out into the streets. When he did, on June 15, 1914 he was surrounded by a mob and narrowly escaped violence. The police intervened. On the reopening of parliament on September 17 the riotous scenes in the lower house were repeated." The following day the government majority again excluded the opposition. These events show the straits to which the Austro-Hungarian oligarchy were put in getting the increase in the army and navy and in heading off governmental reform.

These increases in war armament in Germany and Austria-Hungary in 1912-13 have compelled similar action in the adjoining states of France, Great Britain and Russia, while here in the United States of America we have voted to lay down three more great battleships.

In 1912 while the German and Austro-Hungarian war lords were putting through the recent increase in armament, the British government suggested a "naval holiday," a cessation for the year from laying down more Dreadnoughts. Of course the ruling few could not stop and continue in power.

From the foregoing facts it appears that the German and Austro-Hungarian oligarchies are an obstruction to world peace. Its self-interest and self-preservation compel it to direct their countrymen's attention outward.

On the other hand, in France, England and the other countries where the people are in power—where liberal governments exist—the self-interest is for the stoppage of dreadnought building, and for agreements to arbitrate.

But not until the German oligarchy, at least, shall be replaced with a liberal government will the way be opened for world peace.
