

SEEK REMOVAL AMERICAN TROOPS

LAREDO, Texas, Aug. 19.—Resolutions asking that General Carranza's first official act after he reaches Mexico City be a request to withdraw United States troops from Vera Cruz, of which they are "an affront to the Mexican nation," were adopted Monday at a mass meeting in Saltillo, according to travelers reaching the border.

PRIMARY ELECTION RESULTS IN NEBRASKA

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 19.—With returns from ninety three counties of the state coming in slowly owing to the length of the ballots of yesterday's statewide primary, all indications point to the renomination of Governor John H. Morehead on the democratic gubernatorial ticket by a vote that will equal the combined total of his two chief opponents, Richard L. Steffe, former civil governor of the Panama Canal zone, and George W. Herge.

R. Beecher Howell, republican national committeeman, is leading in the race for the republican nomination for governor with J. H. Kemp running a close second.

Governor Morehead and Mr. Howell carried Lancaster county (Lincoln) and Douglas county (Omaha) by safe majorities.

All indications point to the renomination of the present congressmen on their respective tickets.

CANNING FACTORY STARTS PUTTING UP TOMATOES

The canning of tomatoes began at the Hoke cannery yesterday. Although not a full crew was put to work much progress was made and it will be but a short time until the local crop will be canned. Only the choicest grades are being put up.

According to the rules given out by Mr. Hoke it is not permissible to throw in any culls and he particularly cautions his employees to use every precaution possible in selecting the tomatoes. Everything is up-to-date and modern.

It is not necessary for the workers to wear rubber aprons as is the custom in many canneries, but instead modern conveniences have been added making it clean and attractive work. Many citizens visited the cannery yesterday and all were pleased.

With European industry stopped by the war the demand for the manufactured products, as well as for the food products, of the United States must increase by leaps and bounds. This country can supply the demand provided the transportation facilities can be found. We can sell the goods if we can deliver them.

According to a statement issued by the Pan American Union, Washington, D. C., the situation may be relieved to an extent by the merchant marine of several South American countries. Accustomed to shipping their goods in European vessels, the exporters of the United States have perhaps lost sight of the fact that Brazil and Argentina on the Atlantic and Chile and Peru on the Pacific have lines of merchant vessels capable of caring for a considerable volume of international shipping.

Late statistics show that these four countries have a combined total of 469 steamers, classed as sea-going, each of 100 tons net or over, with a total gross tonnage of 549,267. In sailing vessels the same countries have a total of 622 ships, of 50 tons net or over, with a combined gross tonnage of 204,473. Of course, all of these vessels, although classed as sea-going, are not adapted to trans-oceanic traffic.

SOUTH AMERICA TRADE BOOMING

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—The breaking off of commercial relations with Europe has resulted in an unprecedented demand from Latin-American countries for American goods, according to statements today of leading exporters of this city. Exporters say they are rushed with orders from their agents and one merchant declares that all the steamships now plying to South America could handle only one-tenth of the tonnage that could be sold there in the near future.

STRANGE DELUSIONS OF GERMAN SOLDIERS

LONDON, Aug. 19, 9:15 a. m.—The following official statement issued by the French war office is sent to Reuter's Telegram company, by its Paris correspondent: "Correspondence found on the German soldiers show that they are laboring under the strangest delusions. One writes: 'Already we have penetrated sixty kilometers (about thirty seven miles) into France.' Another says: 'Here we are in southern France.'"

"Other letters admit cruelties towards civilians, one saying 'we shot the inhabitants from the ages of 14 to 60 and knocked down thirty dead.'"

FRENCH WARNED BY FRENCHMEN

PARIS, Aug. 19, 4:15 a. m.—"Outpost combats, however interesting and characteristic, do not justify us in counting on the certainty of a prompt and definite victory," writes former Minister of Foreign Affairs Stephen Pichon in the Petit Journal. "I find too much said about the Germans being demoralized. Their original over-confidence may give place to doubts, but that is all.

"The war now beginning is a war to the death. On it hangs the existence of Germany as well as that of France. It will be waged furiously on both sides. It probably will be long and the losses enormous.

"Let us make up our minds to the fact that we have to contend with the most redoubtable army in Europe and have need for all our material and moral forces."

TURKEY FURNISHES ESCORT TO FRENCH SHIP

PARIS, Aug. 19, 8:30 a. m.—The Matin reports that the French boat Sagnallen (reported to have been sold to Turkey) complained to the military government, who asked the captain to leave.

"Good," said the French captain, "but the Breslau threatens to sink us. I will leave on the condition that we are towed by a Turkish boat and conveyed by a Turkish torpedo boat and you as a passenger until we are out of Turkish waters," the governor assented.

WAR CALL IS DISTASTEFUL TO THE AUSTRIAN MASSES

LONDON, Aug. 19, 2:08 a. m.—It is officially stated in Paris that the mobilization of the Austrian army was accompanied by much disorder and even open mutiny in many places owing to the unpopularity of the war among many classes of people. This information is conveyed in a Paris dispatch to the Daily Telegraph which continues:

"In many parts of Austria enthusiasm for the war is completely lacking and the people complain bitterly against spending blood and money in a useless cause."

MONTENEGRINS NEAR REGUSA

LONDON, Aug. 19, 10:30 a. m.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Rome, sent from that city yesterday says that a message from Cetinje states that the Montenegrin army is within two hours' march of Ragusa, a fortified seaport of Austria-Hungary in Dalmatia, 28 miles northwest of Cattaro.

King Nicholas, the message adds, has been notified by the Austrian authorities, that if his army attacks, the large number of prominent and Montenegrins held at Ragusa as hostages will be shot. Among the hostages is Count Ivo Vopiovic, a brother of King Nicholas.

M'REYNOLDS FOR SUPREME BENCH

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The president signed today the following nomination: Attorney General James McReynolds, to be a member of the United States supreme court.

RUSSIAN WARSHIP FOUNDERS AT SEA

LONDON, Aug. 19.—An unsubstantiated report has been received here from St. Petersburg, that the Russian warship foundered in the Black sea, after striking a mine and that the Odessa docks are on fire.

The official information bureau has no confirmation of this report.

LONDON, Aug. 19, 11:30 a. m.—A despatch from Rome to the Star says refugees from Magdeburg, Germany, report that German soldiers fired on 3000 Italians confined in the barracks there, killing seven and wounding 16, because some of them shouted: "Hurrah for Italy!"

POPE PIUS ILL BUT CONVALESCING

ROME, Aug. 18, 8:22 p. m., via Paris, Aug. 19, 3:25 a. m.—The Osservatore Romano, the official organ of the vatican, publishes an official admission of the indisposition of Pope Pius, but says the trouble is a slight bronchial catarrh which is of little importance.

BANK DIRECTORS FORCED TO CASH IN

LITTLE ROCK, Aug. 19.—The first assessment against bank stockholders under Arkansas' new banking law was made yesterday when John M. Davis, state banking commissioner, assessed stockholders of the closed Pine Bluff Bank \$100,000 the full amount of stock to make up the bank's deficit. The law places a double liability of stockholders of banks operating under the state banking department.

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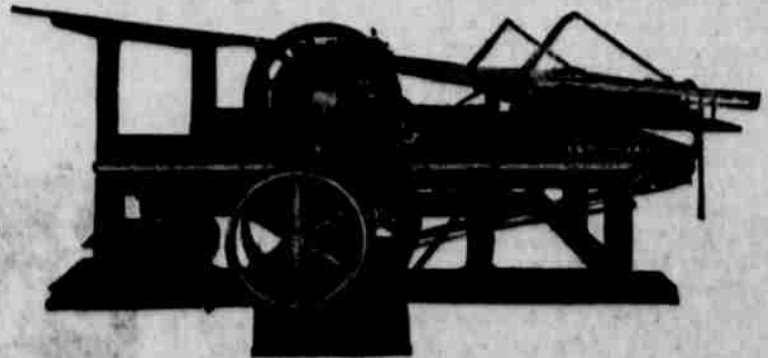
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
